Accompanying the badge and bearing the same number is what is considered, even more important than the badge itself, a certificate of identification, which must be produced when the wearer is called upon to do so by an authorized person, military or police officer, which proves the right of the wearer to use the badge.

Cannot Be Replaced.

A peculiar feature regarding the Class B badge issued to those which have served in England, is that if lost they cannot be replaced. The Class B badge is the one issued by the British Government to the members of the imperial army who have served in the present war, and the British Government will not replace any such badges lost.


