

## SERVICE BADGES NOW ON WAY TO MEN OF DISTRICT

Ninety-Five Sent Out From  
Headquarters Yesterday.

MANY MORE GO SHORTLY

Applications Have Been Re-  
ceived From Western  
Ontario.

War service badges are being mailed in large numbers this week from district militia headquarters. Tuesday the first lot of badges went out to their owners, when 95 were forwarded by registered mail to various places throughout Military District No. 1.

A few badges that were received at the office of Major C. O. Fairbank, officer in charge of war service badges for Western Ontario, have been mailed during the past few weeks, as they came in from Ottawa, but not until this week did the badges arrive here in large numbers.

All four classes of badges are represented in the lot that went out to their owners. The largest number were of Class A, sent to those who have been refused enlistment through physical unfitness, while a large number received Class A or Class B, the former for service at the front, and the latter for service in England. In many cases those who received a Class A badge having served in both France and England. Very few Class C badges issued to those who have served in Canada have been sent out as yet.

Those who have the badge issued by the Canadian patriotic fund must hand it over to the authorities before they can receive the official badge. If the patriotic fund badge has been lost, an affidavit must be taken by the man who owned it to that effect before he can receive the official badge as used by the Canadian Government. In order to safeguard those who should rightfully wear the war service badge, and to prevent the badges being worn by impostors, heavy penalties have been provided for the misuse of the badge. Offenders in this regard render themselves liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500, or to imprisonment, not exceeding six months. Those who make any false representation, or in any way fraudulently attempt to obtain any badge or certificate accompanying a badge, render themselves liable to the same penalties.

Accompanying the badge and bearing the same number is what is considered, even more important than the badge itself, a certificate of identification. The certificate is produced when the wearer is called upon to do so by an authorized person, military or military officer, which proves the right of the wearer to use the badge.

Cannot Be Replaced. A peculiar feature regarding the Class B badge issued to those who have served in England, is that if lost they cannot be replaced. The Class B badge is the one issued by the British Government to the members of the Imperial army who have served in the present war, and the British Government will not replace any such badge lost.

It would be useless for those who have the patriotic fund badge to try to obtain it, and yet obtain the official badge for the applications for all badges are investigated most searching at Ottawa, and the list of those who received badges from the patriotic fund is scrutinized in each case to find out whether the applicant has received the patriotic fund badge or not. To sell, buy, manufacture or wear any other than the official badge is illegal.

Class A badge is for members and ex-members of the C. E. F. who have been on active service at the front in the present war and who come within the following qualifications:

(a) Honorably retired or discharged from the C. E. F., or returned to Canada and retained on duty (or under treatment in military or convalescent hospital).

(b) Not struck off strength for any of the following reasons:

(1) Discharged as unlikely to become an efficient soldier, unless incapacity is due to military service.

(2) Discharged by reason of stoppage of working pay.

(3) Struck off strength or discharged within three months of appointment or enlistment, unless incapacity is due to military service.

All persons entitled to Class A badge are also entitled to Class B badge, provided they are honorably discharged.

Class B badge is for members of the C. E. F. who have been on duty in England during the present war, and who come within the following qualifications:

(a) Honorably returned or discharged from the C. E. F.

(b) Been rendered permanently unfit for further military service on account of old age, wounds, sickness, or other cause.

(c) Not been struck off strength or

discharged for any of the three reasons mentioned in paragraph (b) of Class A.

Class C badge is for members of the C. E. F. not included in Class A or B, and who come within the following qualifications:

(a) Honorably discharged or retired from the C. E. F.

(b) Been rendered permanently unfit for further military service on account of old age, injuries or sickness.

(c) Not been discharged for any of the three reasons in paragraph (b) of Class A.

It will thus be seen that at least three months' service in Canada is required for Class C, unless discharged through incapacity due to service.

Class D badge is for members of the C. E. F. who have been rendered unfit for service by reason of having been discharged for any of the three reasons mentioned in paragraph (b) of Class A, and who have been declared medically unfit for service by a medical board at the time of making application for the badge.

Class D badge is also for men who offered to enlist prior to August 10, 1917, and were rejected as medically unfit, and who have been declared medically unfit for service by a medical board at the time of making application for the badge.

All applications for badges must be made to Major C. O. Fairbank, officer in charge of war service badges, Military District No. 1, Wolseley Barracks, London, Ont. They will then be given an application form to be filled out, or if for Class D, directed to a medical board.

Will Be Examined. The forms when filled out and returned to Major Fairbank will be examined and sent to Ottawa, and, if approved, the badges returned in due time, to be handed to the owners, or sent to them by registered mail.

Men applying for Class D must submit proof before the medical board that they tried to enlist before August 10, 1917, and were rejected as medically unfit.







When the returned soldier went to his father's bedside he recognized him, but he was too low to speak to him. He was a resident of Oxford County. He was 55 years old and was born in Niagara Township. He had been ill for several weeks. He is survived by his wife, two sons and one daughter.
