Chapman Wanted for Many Frauds

The Toronto Globe says: Fleeing as fast as the express would carry him for Chicago and the States, a man named H. Chapman was arrested Sunday night at London on the C. P. R. train on information telephoned and wired by Inspector Duncan from Toronto that he was wanted in the Queen City for numerous frauds on Italians.

Chapman came to one of the best hotels in the town some days ago and registered there as H. Chapman. Soon after his arrival he went to Mr. Michael Basso on Elm street and told him that he wanted to get some Italians to work for him, and inquired where he could find them. He was directed to 150 Terauley street, where a number of Italians stay, and so inquired to go and see him at his hotel. Some of the men from whom he got money say that Chapman can speak a little Italian, but certainly is no countrymen of theirs. When Chapman got five of the Italian standpoints in hotel he showed them his room at his pressive-looking contracts and wrote down their name, age, nationality and many other facts he elicited from them. Then he told them that he wanted to engage them for service in the hotel he was staying at, that they would only have to work four hours a day and that a considerable amount of that time would be put in studying in the library. But before they got the positions they must have uniforms, and

to buy the uniforms he must have \$15 from each of them. Four of them handed over \$15 each and the fifth all he had, \$9. The contracts Chapman gave the Italians were headed in type-written characters "Queen's University," and he told them that if not employed at the hotel he would find them work at an Italian college in the city.

Hearing further of the wonderful promises made by Chapman, Mr. Basso became suspicious and communicated with the police, and he found that Chapman had already left the hotel and the city on the 7:15 train for Chicago. They learned that he had a first-class ticket for the Windy City, and after particulars of his appearance, Inspector Duncan immediately telephoned and wired to the police at London and Windsor to arrest Chapman as he came through. The description wired of him was that he was an Italian, but might be taken for a Hebrew; was about 35 years of age, five feet six inches in height, dark complexion and was wearing a brown hard felt and a dark suit. "The other particulars enabled the Detective Rider and Egleton of the London force to arrest him on the C. P. R. Windsor train at about half-past 11 last night. He then was stylishly dressed and was wearing diamonds. He denied that he had done any wrong, but submitted to arrest without giving any trouble. Detective Kennedy will go up to London to bring him back to Toronto.

SENSE OF DUTY TOWARDS GOD

Evangelist Jameson, of New York, Addressed the Local W. C. T. U.

U. was commenced last evening, when a number of the members and friends of the organization were addressed by Miss Jameson, of New York, traveling evangelist of the New York State W. C. T. U. in the Dundas Center Methodist Church, and in the evening in the First Presbyterian Church.

TO GIVE SETTLER NATURAL WEALTH

Bill Before Legislature Makes Important Changes in the Homestead Act.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Feb. 11.—Monday's tentative session of the Legislature, like that of Friday, was marked by the introduction of an important piece of legislation, in the shape of a bill granting to bona fide settlers any minerals found on lands which are sold as agricultural lands.

This reform has long been desired by the settlers in Northern Ontario, and has been frequently advocated by the members from those districts. Mr. Cochrane stated that he would today introduce an amendment to the free grant lands act.

Mr. Cochrane's act, which is an amendment to the public lands act, provides that when it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the minister of lands, forests and mines by inspection and report of an officer appointed by him for the purpose, that crown lands in any township or portion of a township, not reserved from settlement, are not valuable for mines or minerals, but are agricultural lands or lands suitable for cultivation and settlement, the minister may, under order-in-council, open such lands to actual settlers, and such settlers shall be entitled to all mines or minerals thereafter found thereon.

The act is made retroactive. Clause 2 provides that in all townships already opened for sale, the minister may, at the request of any purchaser or any person claiming under such purchaser, declare such purchaser entitled to the mines and minerals thereafter found, if the same are the property of the crown and not staked out, recorded, leased or granted under the mines act. All sales of agricultural land under this act heretofore made in such townships shall include the mines and minerals therein.

Clause 3 provides that all reservations of mines and minerals, expressed or implied in any patent heretofore issued, where such is the property of the crown and not granted under the mines act, are rescinded, and all minerals pass to the owners of the land.
