QUESTIONS FOR TODAY. 12. Verse 6—Why is it so that when a true Christian dies he does not find what he expects, that he always finds something better? 13. Why did not that empty tomb make their hearts glad in view of what Christ had said to them? (See Matt. xx, 17-19). 14. Verse 7—WHY IS IT THAT THE STORY OF THE RESURRECTION GROWS IN INTEREST THE MORE IT IS TOLD, AND THE BETTER WE UNDERSTAND IT?
