

NO MORE REBATES FOR CARNIVALS MAY BE COUNCIL SLOGAN

Army and Navy Veterans Ask
Remission—Declare They
Were "Stung."

TITE APPEARS RE GAS

Asks Board Be Called—Alder-
men Object—Power Com-
pany Asks Increase.

"No more rebates for carnival companies" may be the slogan adopted by next year's city council as the result of developments at a meeting of No. 1 committee of the council Wednesday afternoon. F. B. Lavendar of the Army and Navy Veterans asked a remission of \$250, the fee for the carnival company which appeared in London earlier in the year under the auspices of his organization. The council will be asked to decide the matter in September.

Putting in mildly Mr. Lavendar declared that they had been "stung." They were promised \$500 which they received, but by the time they had received a bill from the city for \$250 fee, and one of about a similar size from the utilities commission for light and water to say nothing of a few incidentals such as advertising there was a very small balance. The sale of a car during the carnival somewhat counterbalanced this, Mr. Lavendar declared that as far as carnival companies it was a case of "never again" with him.

Always Play.
Ald. Cunningham declared that the carnival companies always played some new society for "suckers." The only thing they gave was the fees which they should properly pay to the city.

W. G. Tite appeared in connection with resolutions of the Trades and Labor Council, asking that the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board be called in to operate the gas plant.

Ald. Harley thought this would be useless. Ald. Cunningham asked Ald. Cameron Wilson, chairman of the special gas committee, what he thought of the proposal. Ald. Wilson replied that they had investigated it thoroughly, and that the city had no legal position in regard to the matter. He objected strongly to advertisements of the gas company, which he stated credited the gas committee with approving the increase. They had done nothing of the kind. "My personal idea as to the railway board is that the less we have to do with them the better," he said.

The Helena Heating and Power Company gave notice that it would have to increase the rates for heating the central fire hall at least 50 per cent next September. They stated that coal, which formerly cost \$2.99 at their plant, now cost \$16, and that they paid 50 per cent more for eight hours' labor than they did for twelve hours.

Mr. Tite protested against the sale of the east end hall. Chairman Cunningham said that it would not be advertised for sale until the council met in September.

No action was taken on the erection of lights on Bedford street, pending grading.

**BIG SHOWS TO PLAY

There also is the Garden of Allah, a far eastern revue, presenting a company assembled from many countries of the Orient and offering a clean, wholesome exhibition. The water circus, with Lucile Anderson and her bathing girls, is an unusual feature.

For thrills there is the Wall of Death, where I. J. Watkins, Hazel Watkins, Johnny Dabbe and other motorcycle riders and automobile drivers race on a perpendicular wall, 25 feet in height. This is the largest portable motordrome ever built, and is declared to be a "thrill factory" beyond compare. OUTING AT NIAGARA**

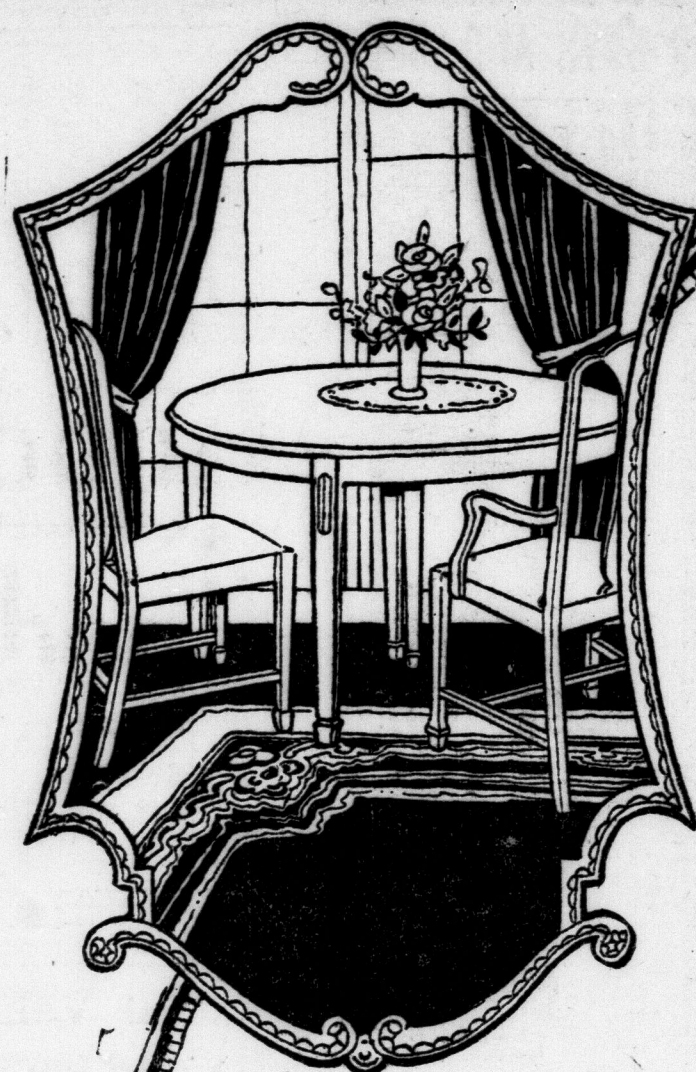
A unique feature at the Dunlop Rubber Company's outing this year was the meeting of Dunlop Canada and Dunlop America on the historic grounds of Niagara.
