

DEMIES CHARGE OF GAMBLING

Police Magistrate Hears a Peculiar Case Against Julius Siskind.

Although the police described Julius Siskind standing behind his counter in his second-hand store at 335 Richmond street with a complete gambler's paraphernalia spread before him on the night of October 5, and an interested group of men gathered about the counter, one of whom had money in his hand, Siskind was able to prove in police court today that he was not guilty of operating a gambling house. He claimed that he was endeavoring to sell the outfit to Charles Lewis, one of the men.

The store was raided by Police Sgt. Thomas Lucas, accompanied by a police constable at 7:20 o'clock in the evening. They acted on information which had been given to them by a man watching the group of men, whom they claimed were deeply interested in something on the counter, from across the road the constables investigated. When they entered the door while a man, who was alleged to have been buying had his back turned, Sgt. Lucas said that the group of men scattered, one trying to make a getaway through the back door.

What They Found. On the counter was found a canvas bag with gambling devices and a dice box, two dice in one of the hands of another. The equipment was produced in court. One who claimed to be a witness of the game, not a participant, refused to give evidence. A man under the influence of liquor was found lying behind some boxes. Julius Siskind, who had been given a hearing in operation, had not been there during any part of the evening. One of the men, Charles Lewis, came to the store to buy a game, which he said, he wanted to use on board the boats. As Mr. Siskind had no crown and anchor game, he tried to sell him the outfit he was showing. He used the dice merely to demonstrate that the game was played. He was not aware that anyone had money in their hands until the police came in. He said he was a sailor on the great lakes.

Peter Sansone, who was found with money in his hand, claimed that he had not used it in the game. He was aware what the men were doing, as he was waiting for the sick man at the time of the raid. William Patterson was also called, but was unable to prove that he was merely a customer.

Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon said that it would be useless to convict Siskind, although the money was found. He dismissed the case. A. M. Judd appeared for the defence.

ADMITS HE PASSED WORTHLESS CHECK

Norman Belcher May Be Cared For in Westminster Hospital.

After Norman Belcher, a local youth who was arrested last week on a charge of obtaining \$25 under false pretences from Herbert Mills, had heard the evidence against him, in police court today, acting on the advice of his counsel, he changed his plea to guilty. Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop told Magistrate Graydon that Belcher was addicted to the use of drugs, and therefore should be put in a place of safekeeping, where he could be treated. The prisoner may be sent to Westminster Hospital, although judgment was reserved for one week, pending a return of the money to Mills. A. M. Judd, who appeared for the defence, stated that Belcher was a patient of the jail physician would pass upon the case. Secretary E. J. Lane of the Soldiers' Aid Commission said that the accused would be given treatment and that he would be kept confined to the institution.

Belcher pleaded guilty to passing a worthless check on Norman Mills, the manager of a local poolroom on August 20 last. According to the evidence given by Mills, Belcher had been found in possession of a check on the Bank of Montreal for \$15. He asserted that he had cashed the check at the bank and that the money would be deposited in the bank, as a pension check for \$42 was expected. Later in the afternoon, he returned to the bank and asked for the money, but was told that the check was not cashed. He then fled, leaving the bank with a check for \$15 more given him.

On the stand, Mr. Lane claimed there was a check received from the Government for Belcher, but that it had been applied in full on a debt which Belcher owed to the Government. James D. Mills, accountant at the branch of the Bank of Montreal stated that no account had ever existed in the bank under the name of Norman Belcher for the past few years. The prisoner's father expressed the desire that Belcher be sent to an institution where he would be treated.

HEAVY RAINS FLOOD LARGE AREAS IN ALL PARTS OF FRANCE

Damage to Vineyards in Many Sections of the Country.

Paris, Oct. 11.—Torrential rains in virtually all parts of France have sent rivers out of their banks and have resulted in heavy property damage. The Seine, the Marne, the Rhone, the Garonne and Tarn Rivers have overflowed, and reports state that many domestic animals and other property have been destroyed. In several localities in the Department of Sevannes the people have been obliged to leave their homes. Vineyards have been submerged in the Department of Herault, and the city of Nîmes has been cut off from the rest of the country. Lower sections of Toulon are reported to be inundated.

Along the Mediterranean coast the storm is still raging, and several rivers in the neighborhood of Marseilles have overflowed. Railroad and highway communication around Nice have been interrupted.

Real Whiskey Ousts "Hootch" in New York, Now Wide Open; Bogus Dry Sleuths Get Rich

New York, Oct. 9.—Intoxicating liquor flows freely in New York in defiance of the federal prohibition amendment and the Volstead enforcement act, and it is possible to get a drink anywhere in Manhattan if you have the price, says a competent authority. Drunkenness is more prevalent than it was at the same time last year, according to police officials. The two city hospitals caring for inebriates not only have had to reopen their alcoholic wards, but are treating more patients than for the same period a year ago. The city magistrates' courts have received more alcoholic cases recently than for a corresponding period in 1919, and the drunks have been more disorderly. "Squirrel hootch" has been displaced by "straight hootch."

KEEN INTEREST IN SAFETY WEEK COST PAR \$400

Hearty Co-operation All Over City in Work To Prevent Accidents.

"Safety Week" was safely launched in London today as the opening of a brilliant lightning display and peals of thunder. No exceptional events marked the first efforts of the Safety League, but much valuable propaganda was distributed. Perhaps the most noticeable feature of the campaign was the series of signs painted on the pavements at intervals, and the safety zones marked out across Dundas and Richmond streets. The signs were placed on the streets with the object of ending the pernicious habit of "jay-walking." At points where the careless pedestrian is apt to step from the curb and dash across the thoroughfare in front of automobiles and street cars, a large legend on the pavement confronts him. "Look out—You're in the way," are the most common.

CHARGES OF INVASION AND PIRACY THREATENED AGAINST LICENSE OFFICERS

Proprietor of Vendome Hotel, Sandwich, and Owner of Palatial Yacht Alleged To Have Appealed To Attorney-General For Protection From Raids Made in Search For Illegal Whisky Supplies.

Windsor, Oct. 10.—Charging that the special liquor sleuths appointed by the Ontario License Commission to assist in cleaning up the city of Windsor are interfering with the sacred rights of personal liberty, disturbing the peace and committing piracy, a party of almost nightly visits at 2 and 3 o'clock in the morning. A. C. Barrington, proprietor of the Vendome Hotel, Sandwich, late on Saturday forwarded an appeal for protection, through his solicitor, to the attorney-general at Toronto.

The complaint is based on dispositions made by Barrington and his daughter, who charge Barrington brothers, special runners, with invading their hotel almost nightly for two or three weeks past, often breaking in after the doors have been locked for the night and searching the premises without a warrant. On several occasions, the complaint states, guests were taken from their beds, and one night four were taken from the hotel for no reason whatever, and no charges were later preferred against them, nor were they locked up. No liquor was found during any of the visits, nor were any intoxicated persons arrested. In that the hostelry is operated under a standard hotel license, protection is sought from a repetition of these raids.

That technical charges of piracy on the high seas are pending as the result of a raid on the yacht of one of Windsor's well-known residents, a party of almost nightly visits at 2 and 3 o'clock in the morning. CHEMICAL RESEARCH SUBJECT OF LECTURE AT ROTARY LUNCHEON

Thomas Faust Gives Instructive Talk On "Industrial Chemistry."

An interesting address on "Industrial Chemistry" by Thomas Faust, of the Yocum-Faust Company, was the feature of the Rotary Club luncheon at the Trenchum House at noon today. The address was illustrated with some chemical experiments and dealt largely with the preparation of chemicals for use in the laboratory, and the conditions for use in combining and marketing, preparing raw silk for carding and other industrial processes. A research laboratory is being conducted by Mr. Faust in the manufacturing branch of his company, and for research work very expensive equipment is required. Failure of many firms in the industrial chemistry line, Mr. Faust attributed to the lack of such money in research work, out of all reasonable proportion to the revenue.
