MATERNITY DEATH RATE REDUCED BY PRE-NATAL CARE
Dr. Tew Emphasizes Value of Clinic Established Here.

"Pre-natal care" was the subject of an intensely interesting and instructive address delivered before the Union Mothers' Club at the Lord Roberts School last night by Dr. Tew of this city. The speaker declared that he believed that within five or six years' time, every town and rural centre, as well as every city in Ontario would have a general clinic, such as the clinic now established at Victoria Hospital in London; and this because pre-natal care was considered to be of greatest importance in the reduction of the death rate of both mother and child; that it was necessary to be impressed on every mother that the prevention of the absolute necessity of such care.

Tracing the history of the science of obstetrics from the early stages of midwifery to the present-day science, the speaker referred to the time when doctors were not permitted into the room of the mother, until every resource of the midwife had been tried and failed. He then mentioned the gradual rise to prominence of the skilled physician. Making special mention of the pioneer clinic held at Toronto for some eight or nine years, the speaker showed, by figures, how small was the percentage of deaths when proper care was given.

Greatly reduced rates of infant mortality in England, which provided English mothers with pensions and medical attendance, the act insisted on six weeks' rest, four weeks of leave before the birth of the child, and the fact that this act had greatly reduced the death rate in England.

Miss Bertha Smith, head of the local Child Welfare nurses, was also present, pointing out to the mothers the opportunity offered to them in the Victoria hospital. Miss Smith also referred to the early organization of a class in cooking at the Technical School for mothers of young children. This class, she said, would be started in a week or so's time, and it was expected that many mothers would avail themselves of it so as to learn how to prepare properly nourishing food for their children. Miss Ella Davis, superintendent of No. 28 Nursing Division, St. John Ambulance Brigade, also spoke, pointing out the importance of the new classes in "pre-natal care" as well as the regular classes in home nursing and first aid.

Vote of Appreciation.
In the business meeting which pre-

ceded the addresses, Mrs. John Gemmell, who was in the chair, referred to the Collegiate Institute question as settled for the present. A vote of appreciation was tendered the three pioneer women members of the board of education, who no longer acted on it. Regret was expressed that Mrs. Partridge had not been appointed to the board of health, but confidence was expressed in the present board. Mrs. John I. A. Hunt, the new school trustee was introduced to the meeting. A further matter of business was an expression of willingness to support the Local Council of Women's recommendation that voting day be changed from New Year's Day to the first Monday of December. The other recommendation that an association of voters be organized in the city, was sent back to the individual clubs to be discussed. It was suggested that three representatives from each club, rather than three from the Union Club, should be on such an association, if formed.

May Increase Donations.
In reference to the Union Mothers' Club's donation to the Children's Hospital, it was suggested that the first \$1,000 might be increased to \$2,500. A vocal solo by L. Christiani, and violin solo by Mrs. Ernest Phillips completed the program. M. B. Adams and Mrs. Charles Turner acted as accompanists.

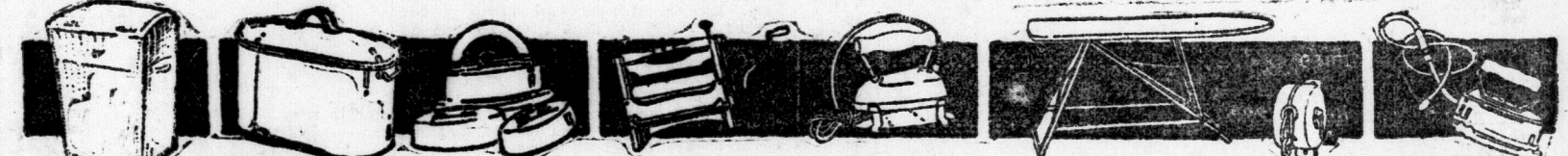

KILLED BY STORM ON VANCOUVER ISLAND

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 31.—Frank Smith, 28, an employee of a logging company at Jordan river, was instantly killed Saturday night and the whole of Vancouver Island was completely iso-

lated from telegraphic and telephonic communications with the outside world as a result of a storm of hurricane proportions which struck the lower portion of the island at 6 o'clock Saturday and which continued until 7 p.m. Sunday. The wind at times attained a velocity of 60 miles an hour. Street car service here had to be discontinued for several hours and the lighting system was also put out of commission for an hour. Rain accompanied the wind at intervals. Scores of trees were up-

rooted. Smith met his death while returning to his home at Jordan river in an automobile with several friends. Near Cole Creek, a huge tree blown down by the wind smashed across the car crushing Smith to death and injuring the other occupants.
