#### How a Queen Was Duped.

MADRID, March 23 .- The judges in the Elena Sanz affair called at the palace yesterday to take the evidence of the Queen Mother. Elena Sanz was a Spanish actress

by whom King Alfonso XII. had two natural sons. These children are now suing the heirs of Alfonso XII. for an annuity which they claim was left to their mother by the king and which was to revert to them.

The queen deposed that a few days after the death of Alfonso XII. Senor Salmeron came to Senor Abbella, who was then Master of the Household, and told him that Elena Sanz had in her possession certain letters of the late king, the publication of which would cause a great scandal.

She would give them up for \$15,000 and in addition Salmeron claimed \$1000 and the matter. Trust-

for his services in the matter. Trust-ing to the integrity of Salmeron, the queen paid over these two sums and was assured by him that all the letters in question had been destroyed.

"The main line of travel for Canadian lake freight steamers is from the head of Lake Superior to Georgian Bay ports or thru the Welland Canal to Kingston crossing Lake Superior, Sault River, Lake Huron and Georgian Bay, St. Clair and Detroit Rivers, Lake Erie and Ontario, and over half of the bottom damage to these ships takes place north of Sarnia, principally in the Sault River, and on the average it would not take over 24 hours for any of the ships damaged from Lake Erie to Lake Superior to reach Collingwood, and, as the time men-tioned is about two-fifths of one per cent. of the annual period of lake navigation, it goes to show how little strength there is to the statement that the Collingwood drydock is not conveniently located.
