## BIG BASEBALL PROFITS IN THE MAJOR LEAGUES

Net Margin on the Average for  
One Club for Year \$200,000,  
Says Sam Crane.

The profits of a major league baseball club in a big city are something enormous, writes Sam Crane in New York Press, and while club owners endeavor to hide their business from the general public, baseball fans and the business public who make the national game popular and prosperous and the immense profits possible have a right to know something about where all the good money that they produce at the box office every day, week, and month, is being spent. As a general thing the major league clubs do not have to pay the attendance figures, and that is their privilege, if they so desire; but to one who has had experience in sizing up crowds for years, a guess at the number of a crowd is not so very far out of the way.

**Seating Capacities.**  
The seating capacities of the various grounds are well known. They are not kept secret, so it is not a very difficult proposition to come within a few hundred of the correct numbers of a baseball crowd. The Polo grounds will seat 31,000 people; Highland Park, 18,000; Fenway Park, 25,000; Shibe Park, 25,000; Philadelphia Park, 20,000; West Side Park, 30,000; South Side Park, 25,000; and nearly every club of the sixteen in both major leagues can seat 15,000 people or over. Consequently there could hardly be any limit established for a total attendance. If every day was a Saturday, a Sunday or a holiday, but you do not have to go to Fenway Park, so that even a club owner who wants to hide figures cannot find fault. Well, we will take the salaries of the players, which I place at \$25,000. This is an average of \$3000 a man

## RESTIGOUCHE WINNER STAKE AT SARATOGA

Shilling Lands the Feature, Also  
Two Other Races—Entries  
for To-Day.

SARATOGA, Aug. 12.—Restigouche, outclassing his field, easily won the Schenectady stake, one mile, the feature of the card here to-day. Shilling had a good day, riding the winners of the second, third and fourth races. Butwell was severely criticized for his ride on Herkimer in the second. He was riding the best horse, but he pulled on the rail in the deep going which brought about the defeat of the colt.

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The coming race meeting should get the support of all horsemen, and be made a big success. If so, Toronto will likely see the greatest horse meeting ever held in Canada at Dufferin Park this winter. Five or six \$1000 stake races will be on the program, and no purse less than \$500 will be given.

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Now we will take up the matter of receipts. There is no matter of receipts at all. It is not good for a 2500 attendance, but in the western cities, where Sunday ball is allowed, the Giants are sure of a few short of that number. But I tendence figures to go by. I shall be almost too conservative, some might say. Now we will say that an eastern club has thirteen Saturdays at home. We will allow the home club \$500 for each game, and \$2500 for the season. Each club is scheduled for 77 games at home and abroad. With the thirteen Saturdays off, that will leave 64 week days, and they ought to average the home club \$2000 away from home at \$2000 each, \$25,000, and 55 week days abroad at \$4500 each, \$25,000. This totals up all told for receipts, \$75,000. Here is the summary:
