PRICES ARE FIRM DESPITE RAIN

LOCAL MARKET.

LONDON, Saturday, July 4

The weather was against a number of farmers stopped at home rather than run the risk of getting a soaking and as usual on a wet day, sales and prices were generally lower. This could hardly be said of today's market, as sales were quite brisk, and prices firmer than last week, especially for potatoes and butter.

Hay and Straw—Several loads of old hay was brought in which sold at \$9 to \$9.50 per ton. There will be a good demand on Monday. No straw was offered.

Grains—The supply of oats consisted of only a couple of loads, which sold at \$1.50 per cwt. Wheat is steady at 80c per bushel, and barley at \$1.32 per cwt.

Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes are going high in price, as \$1.50 was paid for the few small lots offered. Caradoc is the township were the bulk of the potatoes are grown for the city, and the farmers who reside there say there is hardly a bag to be obtained. New potatoes were in good demand at \$2.50 per bushel. They will be considerably less in less than a week. Tomatoes were scarce at 15c per pound. Cucumbers, higher at 60c to 70c per dozen. Cabbages, 50c to 90c per dozen.

Radishes, lettuce, onions and beets were sold at 20c per dozen. Green peas sold at 12c to 15c per dozen. Beans sold at 12c to 15c per dozen.

Strawberries are about done for this season. The few loads offered sold at 9c to 10c per box. Raspberries ranged from 7c to 10c per quart. Gooseberries are slow at 7c per box.

Raspberries sold quickly at 12c to 15c per box. Black currants sold at 12c to 15c per box and red at 7c.

Poultry—Spring chickens were in demand at 40c to 50c per pair alive or 50c to 60c per dressed. Ducks sold at \$1 to \$1.25 per pair. Old fowl at 8c per pound alive or 10c dressed.

Dressed Hogs—Not many on sale at \$5.50 per cwt.

Live Hogs—Prices for Monday will be 25c per cwt higher than last week. The figures will be \$5.50 per cwt. Small pigs are higher at \$5 to \$7 per pair.

Butchers' Meat—Beef sold at \$6 to \$9 per cwt, mostly at \$8. Veal \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt. Spring lambs, \$5 to \$7 each. The price of beef will be lower in less than a week as the grass cattle are being offered.

The symptom is much more favorable, and physicians are very hopeful this morning. The bishop's room is kept filled with oxygen and electric fans are continuously going.

DUMA PASSES BUDGET

Amounts To \$1,250,000,000—Deficit for 1908.

St. Petersburg, July 4.—The Douma at midnight approved the budget amounting to \$1,250,000,000.

M. Kokovstov, the finance minister, said he thought the country's financial system had fully sustained the test to which it had been subjected. Notwithstanding the recent war and internal disorders, he said, the ordinary expenditures by \$4,650,000. The deficit for 1908, he thought, could not shake Russia's financial position.
