ARNDEN GARDENS, Jan. 29.—De la Salle and Pickering College met this afternoon after the game between Battery and Riversides. Both colleges had out their strongest teams. The local collegians were favorites owing to their win over Pickering at Newmarket.

DIBLE EJECTED HEAD  
OF NEW CYCLE RIDERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—At a meeting of the Cycle Racing Men's Union of America at Newark the other day, bicycle riders elected a board of control to handle cycling in place of the National Cycling Association, the body they are endeavoring to overthrow.

Harold Dible, well-known in the A. U. was elected chairman. Other members of the committee are Dr. George J. Muth, Dr. A. J. Bire, William Coburn and Hugh R. Brown. These men will not have full power to act, but will work in conjunction with two delegates from the riders and two from the promoters.

A proposition was put up to the riders to compete in ten-hour-day six-day races in St. Louis, Milwaukee and Kansas City for 30 per cent. of the gross receipts and transportation. The riders turned this down and demanded 40 per cent. of the receipts and an eight-hour race, along with transportation. The offer was made by Packy McFarland, who is to conduct the proposed race in Chicago.

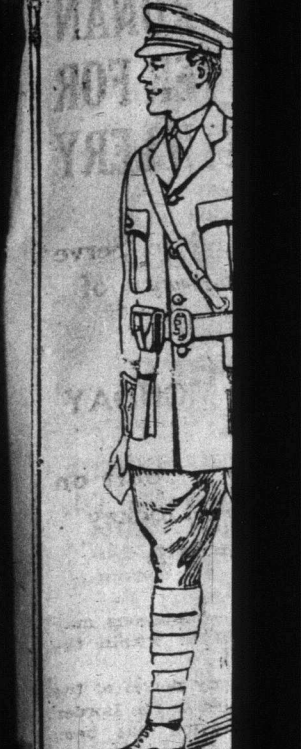

TO MERGE PROBLEMS OF NATIONAL DEFENCE  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—A proposal to co-ordinate the national defense problems thru a joint congressional committee was laid before the senate today by Senator Newlands.

Various hearings on army bills have been held, and other aspects of the national defense question are being discussed at the same time it was impossible for the question of the military needs of the nation's military needs.

That the committee be empowered to study the general subject of national defense, efficiency of the present army and navy organizations, advisability of compulsory service, of creating a national defense council, and the status of the military schools, including possible co-operation of the navy, the problem of finding auxiliary ships for the navy in war time and various other phases of the whole problem of preparedness.
