Great Movement of Disciples To Double the Membership

Evangelistic Campaign to Be Commenced in Church of Christ, Cecil Street, Led by Rev. Lloyd Dorsie.



CHURCH OF CHRIST.

The Church of Christ on Cecil-street was erected by the Disciples in 1891. The congregation was organized in 1881 and conducted many years as a mission church, receiving aid from the co-operation of Disciples of Christ in Ontario. But for the last three years it has been self-sustaining and is now contributing liberally to missionary work and has entered upon an era of enlarged work under the able pastorate of Rev. Dr. VanHorn.

The Church of Christ in Cecil-street is just entering on an evangelistic campaign. They have invited a representative man to do the preaching, and the congregation has been awakened by its pastor, Dr. J. M. Van Horn, to a lively interest and noble work. The denomination they represent has become one of the most evangelistic among the religious bodies of America. They number little more than a million and a quarter, they have been increasing at a surprising rate, and of their leading papers reporting about 100,000 additions last year. They celebrate their first centennial at Pittsburgh next year, and one of their aims is to double their membership. With a view to this, great meetings are being held in many parts of the United States and the church in Cecil-street seeks to be in line with the movement. Two in the beginning they were quite unpopular because of their attitude toward all human creeds and the Calvinistic tendency of the times, they have long been recognized as thoroughly evangelical. They aim to "exalt Christ

above party," and regard the Bible as an all-sufficient and alone sufficient rule of faith and practice. They claim to have already illustrated the practicability of Christian union on the Divine basis given in Eph. iv. 4-6: "One body and one spirit, even as we are called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all who is above all and thru all and in you all."

In doctrine they are substantially the same as the Baptists, and there is now little more between them than the question of names. But they hold that human names are divisions, and that the only way to the union of all God's people is to accept the New Testament name—Church of Christ, or Church of God.

Dr. Van Horn was last year chairman of a joint committee composed of his own and Baptist people, and the two days were spent in discussing points of doctrine. It was found that there is little of importance to keep them apart more than the name. The church in Cecil-street deserves great credit for the quiet, persistent and even courageous manner in which

it has done its work, and is sure to become one of the great religious forces of the city. A few years ago they built a handsome house of worship, which is a credit to that part of the city, and has continued to be a hive of religious industry.

They are sure to attract attention in the meetings that begin to-day. Rev. Lloyd Dorsie is said to be a stirring, wide-awake preacher, who deals with the living issues of the times.
