Owen Sound, Sept. 30 (Special).—James Creighton, charged with the murder of his wife and two step-daughters, is on trial here for his life. The murders were committed May 24th and the jury yesterday returned a true bill on each of the charges. The defence will be insanity and several alibis are here to give evidence.

**CHATHAM NEWS**

Chatham, N. B., Sept. 30 (Special).—Filo Albert, who recently killed a man named Roth at Lewis, who was attempting to act as peacekeeper in a quarrel, is well known on the North Shore. He ran hotels in Caraquet and Shells and bore an excellent reputation. He is married.

**THE NEWS AND VIEWS OF THE CAMPAIGN**

The Fredericton Herald says of the situation in Westmorland:—"Mr. Emmerson's friends are claiming a majority of 1,600 for him, and the figure does not seem unreasonable."

The Sydney Record says:—"Some Conservative authorities are claiming that the eighteen counties of Nova Scotia will send a supporter, of Borden and Foster to Ottawa. Is this a threat that they will put a Bayne in every constituency?"

Liberals of Lunenburg have organized the N. J. Gillis Club with 150 members.

The Moral and Social Reform League of Charlottetown have decided to engage in the work of electoral reform, and to that end have decided to hold meetings, circulate literature, employ detectives to ferret out election malefactors and prosecute them when caught, an estimate of \$1,500 is put for it all.

There are six constituencies in which elections will be held later than the general election on October 22. These are: Chatham-Saguenay and Gaspe, two in Quebec; Comox-Atlin, Kootenay and Yale-Cariboo, three in British Columbia; and one in the Yukon. In the last mentioned territory the election will not take place probably before December, much time being required to post the notices and forward the papers. In the other constituencies the date is left to the returning officer.

**POLICE COURT**

**Several West Side Boys Faced the Magistrate this Morning.**

The only prisoner on the bench this morning was Henry Gorman, a dishevelled looking individual, who was charged with drunkenness and violently resisting the Thistle curling rink, off Cliff street, when he attempted to pacify them and ordered the men to depart, Gorman struck him on the eye. The latter was immediately taken into custody, but it was only through the co-operation of Policemen Stevens and Gosselin that the refractory drunks could be lodged in a cell. Officer Crawford's countenance betrayed marks of the conflict, his eyes being swollen and colored and his neck and face scratched. Gorman also succeeded in sinking his teeth into the night guard's ear.

He was remanded to jail, after being informed that he was liable to one year in the penitentiary.

The lady reported for loitering on street corners in the West End, namely, Edith McLeod, William Keleher, William Gallaghey, who did not deny to notice the summons for his appearance in court, was another of the crowd. During the night the glass in fire box 123 was broken.

Stephens, who was given an undesirable reputation by Sgt. Ross, said he left the crowd at 7 o'clock.

Warnock stated that he was not in the vicinity of the corners mentioned on Saturday night.

McLeod said he was with the boys only two minutes and Keleher and O'Leary were remaining longer than fifteen minutes.

Every one of the lady's employed with the exception of Stephens, who Officer Gosselin states, has not worked since last winter.

Magistrate Ritchie cautioned the boys against obstructing the pavement and persisting in frequenting corners and gave them some wholesome advice. Stephens was lodged in a cell until 2 p.m. when another report against him for engaging in a fight struggle, will be further investigated.

The four boys liberated were of very respectable appearance, and it is possible that Officer Gosselin may have been mistaken in the identity of disorderly youths.

**MONTREAL STOCKS**

Montreal, Sept. 30 (Special).—A feature of the local market to-day was the sharp advance in Montreal Street. The stock sold early in the morning session at 128, a point above yesterday, and advanced to 138. So advanced, selling from 122 at the opening to 124 at the close of the morning session. C. P. R. also scored a material advance, selling from 17 1/2 up to 17 3/4. New Street sold at 183 and Rio at 6 3/4. Illinois Traction, pfd., changed hands at 87 and 87 1/2.
