BUSY DAY FOR BAND

OF KILTIES IN BANGOR

Will be There on Next Tuesday
—To Wave Flag on Bunker
Hill on Monday

The Bangor Commercial says: The Kiltie band of the 28th Canadian Highland regiment will not be in Bangor on Monday, as it has decided to stay in Boston and take part in a Bunker Hill day celebration, when the band will wave the British flag on the historic hill for the first time since it waved in the world renowned battle. But the band will be in Bangor on Tuesday. The band will leave Boston on Monday night, arriving in Bangor at 5.30 a.m. on Tuesday. Bright and early the band will parade the streets between 6 and 7 o'clock. The public safety committee has obtained the permission of the city government to erect a tent in West Market square for the band's recruiting headquarters. There will be a speaking platform in front of the public safety committee office. At 8.30 a recruiting meeting will start, with music by the band. Mayor Woodman will welcome the Scots and recruiting addresses will be given by Colonel Guthrie for the Highlanders, and by representatives of the army, navy and national guard of the United States.

A little before 10 o'clock, the Kiltie band will escort a party of recruits for the various branches of United States service, army, navy and guard. After that a special car will take the Highlanders to Old Town, and lunch will be eaten there. There will be a concert and recruiting speeches. On the return trip a stop will be made at Aramo, with speeches and music.

Arriving in Bangor, a concert will be given in front of the public safety committee headquarters and the band will furnish music at a Red Cross moving in City hall. At 4.30 the Kilties will march through the business section accompanied by Co. K of the 2nd regiment and possibly other organizations. At 5.30 there will be another concert in front of the public safety committee headquarters. A supper will be served for the band in the banquet room of City hall at 6 o'clock.

At 7.30 a grand recruiting rally and dance will take place in City hall, with bagpipe music. After the dance a sleeping car will be ready for them at the Union station and they will go to bed at once, leaving Bangor at 3 a.m.
