But there were few Canadian concerns paying as much as the 7 per cent, that Canadian General Electric distributed in regular dividends in the depressed period. In the circumstances, with the company's business sharply stimulated in the past year, the extra 1 per cent. that is to be paid with the final dividend of the current year will be regarded as conservative.

There are reasons to believe that it is not in the nature of a bonus but marks the beginning of a 2 per cent, quarterly rate. Until 1908 the company paid 10 per cent. for a long period of years; the dividend fell that year to 7 per cent, which has remained the regular rate with bonuses in two years. Apparently the company is working back to the higher rate paid in the old days.




