## Huddersfield IS Controversy Rages Over BEATEN BY ARSENAL Value of New Resin Rule

Manchester City Again Wins From Leicester and Gets Grip on Cup

LONDON, April 18.—Considerably weakened by the contribution of their three outstanding players in the national cause that was being fought out at Manchester yesterday, Huddersfield Town, champions for the third season in succession of the English Football League, succumbed at Highbury before their runners-up when Arsenal defeated them by three goals to one.

The champions were without the services of their right back, who was playing for England, and of Jackson, their outside right who was assisting Scotland.

Arsenal's team was minus Harper, their international custodian, who was defending the nets for Scotland. Arsenal played a keen game, despite the fact that the result could have no effect in their position in the league. Hume, Lawson and Parker registered goals for the winners, with Derlin, Huddersfield's recent acquisition from Cowdenhealth, registered for the champions.

Only two teams gathered in points away from home, and of these the most important and most necessary win was that obtained at Leicester by Manchester City. The cup-finalists dragged themselves a little further away from the danger zone of relegation by scoring three goals to Leicester's two. Brownell accounted for one and Roberts for two of the Manchester goals and Leicester's comeback was from Hine and Chandler.

Interest in the league battles has ebbed the scale from the top to the bottom. The question of the winner having been disposed of, the problem of which two teams will be relegated to the second division remains to be solved. In the running are Notts County, Burnley, Manchester City and Leeds United. Notts County remained stationary as a result of their defeat at home by Cardiff City. Stanford David registered for Notts, but Ferguson's three goals for the Welshmen, added to one scored by Keenor, were too much to overcome. Burnley gained a point by dividing the issue with Bury, each side obtaining two counters.

MANCHESTER, England, April 18.—Scotland defeated England in the last of the soccer international Saturday, when they maintained their half time margin of one goal to nothing, this being the final score. The game was played at Old Trafford Park, the ground of Manchester United.

## GREB-FLOWERS MEET PLANNED FOR MAY 27

Return Match For Middleweight Championship Being Arranged By Tex Rickard

NEW YORK, April 19.—A return match for the middleweight championship between Tiger Flowers and Harry Greb once again is in the making.

Having been balked by rivalry in the pugilistic marts and rulings by the boxing fathers, from completing negotiations for bouts between Flowers and Mickey Walker, the welter champion, and between Jack Delaney and Paul Berlenbach, the light heavyweight king, Tex Rickard and his matchmaker, Jess McMahon, plan to hold the Greb-Flowers contest in the open, May 27.

Washington recorded six.

The St. Louis Browns drove Whitehill from the mound in the sixth, but were unable to overcome a lead of four runs gained early in the game by Detroit. Doyle permitted the Browns only two hits in three and one-third innings and the Tigers won to 4.

Jess Petty, Brooklyn's left hander, who opened the season with a one hit victory over the Giants, pitched another great game against Art Fletcher's energetic Phillies, beating them 2 to 1.

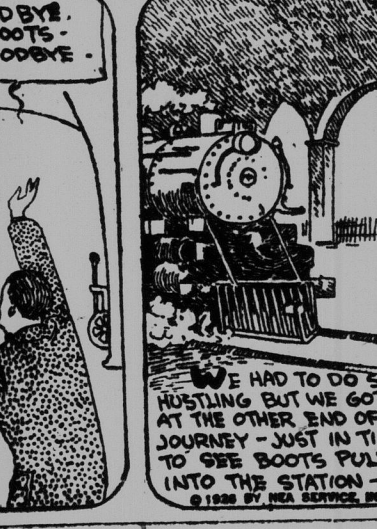

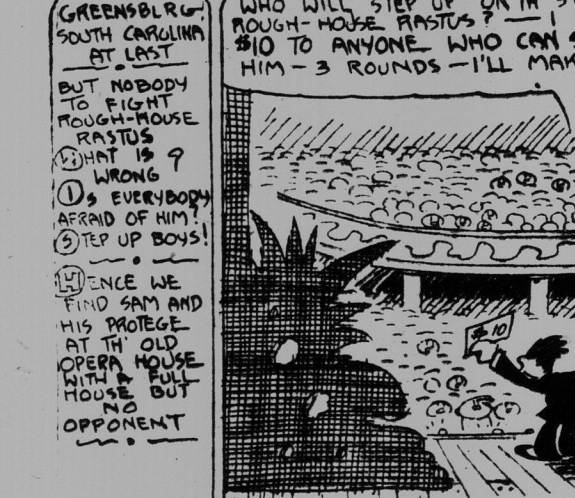
