FOSSIL DUST USED AS DRUGS IN CHINA

Bones of Prehistoric Animals Ground and Sold as Medicine.

How Chinese "miao" the 2,000,000-year-old fossilized remains of prehistoric animals for use as medicine, to supply Chinese drug stores with "dragon's teeth" and "dragon's bones" is described in a report made public by Professor W. D. Matthews, curator of the Department of Vertebrate Paleontology at the American Museum of Natural History, on the fossil specimens collected by Walter Granger, the paleontologist of the Third Asiatic Expedition, which returned to America last Monday. The report is in part: "China is one country where fossil teeth and bones have a considerable value, quite aside from their scientific interest. Fossils have been used as fertilizer, it is true, where they occur in cave deposits or rich pockets, and have been ground up and used for phosphates. But in China they have quite another use, as medicine, and have been mined for centuries to supply the Chinese drug-shops with 'dragon's teeth' and 'dragon's bones,' a regular article of the Chinese pharmacopoeia.

There are, it appears, four ways of administering them. They are ground to powder in a mortar and eaten raw. Or they may be ground and fried with oil in a skillet. Or the powder may be stirred up with ground wine and either drunk off fresh or the mixture left to settle, decanted, and the clear liquid drunk. They are specific for certain nervous diseases, heart troubles and disorders of the liver. Without recommending the remedy for adoption in this country, it is perhaps permissible to point out that, having with our wine would result in a combination of bicarbonate and acid phosphate of lime that might really have some medicinal value, just what may be left to physicians to decide.

The Granger collection covers a series of skulls and innominate jaws, bones, teeth or other fragmentary material of many kinds of animals, probably of late Pliocene age. Stegodon, an extinct proboscidean intermediate between mastodons and elephants, is the largest animal present. A rhinoceros related to the living Indian species; a gigantic tapir, about the size of a horse; a buffalo, related to the Gaur of India; a large pig, larger and smaller deer and antelope, and several kinds, are the chief hoofed animals.

"The carnivores are represented by a tiger, a hyena, a 'part-colored bear' (ailuropus), a sun bear, and badger, a 'wild dog' (canis), and a civet; the primates by a langur and a new genus allied to the gibbon, while a larger bamboo-rat, very abundant, is the sole representative of the rodents. There are no horses and no true dogs, and other animals of the open plains are conspicuously absent, so that the collection is believed to represent the fauna that then inhabited the forests and foothills of South China. Some of the animals of their descendants still survive in South China, some have retreated to India or the Malay States, while others have become extinct.

"According to the views held by some of the best authorities on the ancestry of man, it is in just such a fauna as this that we might expect to find his ancestors of the late Tertiary time. The possibility of such a discovery was well understood, but as yet nothing of the kind has been found in China."

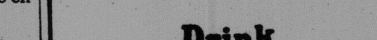
