The Veno Case. Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 2.—The following official notification of the decision of the case arising out of Stanley Shorty's Veno being ineligible to play in the N. B. H. L. while ineligible, as sent out today:—

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 2. A. Leighton, secretary, Chatham Hockey Club, Chatham, N. B.: As a result of ruling of A. A. U. of Canada that Stanley Veno was ineligible to play for Chatham in game of January 6th, that game is declared annulled and order being promulgated today and is ordered replayed on neutral ice. Arrangements are being made to have game replayed at Bathurst on date to be named later. The only other alternative was to order result of game reversed, awarding game to Fredericton, which President Calder of National Hockey League and others advised as proper course, but I have reached conclusion that it did not deliberately and knowingly play Veno in open defiance of orders of A. A. U. of C. and as result have least in most lenient possible manner with case. Complete order will be forwarded in due course.

G. C. KIRBY IS A COUNCILLOR

St. John Engineer Chosen for Office at Annual Meeting in Toronto.

Toronto, Feb. 2.—Hon. Harry Mills, minister of mines for Ontario, on behalf of the Ontario government, welcomed the delegates to the annual convention of the Engineers' Institute of Canada, yesterday. He intimated that the government would give sympathetic consideration to any legislation which the institute might suggest with reference to the vast engineering and mining resources of the province.

The total membership of the institute is 4,049. There is a surplus of \$6,161 in the treasury. The incoming president, John Maurice Roger Fairbairn, is chief engineer of the C. P. R. G. C. Kirby of St. John, was elected a councillor.

R. A. Ross, retiring president, advocated the development of class consciousness among the engineers. He said that no profession emerged as a power for good until it was placed on a class basis. A resolution was passed in favor of establishing a research institute in connection with the Engineering Institute.

LONG VIGIL REWARDED

Waits Seventeen Days and Lands Valuable Coal and Oil Leases in Alberta.

Calgary, Feb. 2.—After a vigil of seventeen days outside the dominion land office, assisted by two returned veterans in his employ as sentinels, C. H. Staffey, secretary-treasurer of the Elgin Coal Company, of Drumheller, succeeded in landing two valuable pieces of land, a coal lease at Drumheller and an oil lease at Caer.

POSSIBILITIES OF MONTREAL FOR THE BIG BOUT

Comment of New York Papers on Negotiations—Would Bring Much American Money Across the Border.

New York, Feb. 2.—(By Canadian Press)—The negotiations now under way between Tex Rickard and C. F. Graham of Montreal, regarding the staging of the Dempsey-Carpenter bout in the Canadian city have been the subject of a good deal of comment in the New York papers. The majority of the local sport writers expressed the view that Rickard will not definitely accept the proposition which has been put up to him by the Montreal promoters at least until he has exhausted every effort to make it possible to hold the fight in New York.

Meanwhile Rickard's negotiations with Mr. Graham and his associates have aroused widespread interest in Montreal's possibilities as a battleground for the fight stars and the advantages which the Quebec city would offer to those who find the Volstead type of beverages not entirely to their taste.

The New York Times in a recent editorial linked up the proposal to hold the big fight in Montreal in a jocular vein with the Forestry Emergency Tariff Bill which would exclude Canadian wheat from the United States by imposing a prohibitive tariff. This article, which was headed "Our Lady of the Blows," declared that the Forestry bill "has stirred some of our Canadian friends into natural threats of commercial retaliation."

"If we won't let their stuff come in, they'll keep ours out, snay their fingers at geography, and buy of the British manufacturer," continues the Times. "New Canadian enterprise seeks to match from us a great national and international industry.
