It is too early to estimate what effect the present big drive may ultimately produce. The United States has recognized the Czecho-Słovak peoples as a co-belligerent nation in the war against Germany and Austria-Hungary.

United States government war expenditures in August broke all monthly records by more than \$100,000,000, amounting to \$1,714,000,000, on reports up to today. Later reports may raise this by \$50,000,000.

The Allies in Northern European Russia, aided by Russian forces, on August Sia, captured the enemy's position north of Obozerskaya; seventy-five miles south of Archangel.
