Joseph Harrington, principal of St. Malachi's school, will have charge of another night school to be started in that district this evening, and he will be assisted by others of the teaching staff. REGINA SCHOOLS SOCIAL CENTRES

New Building to Be Open Night as Well as Day, Says Supt. Perret

SOCIAL SERVICE WORK

Rev. Hugh Dobson Tells How The Department of Temperance and Moral Reform in the Methodist Church Deals With Housing, Sanitation, Child Welfare, and Kindred Subjects

The work for social service that is being done by the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church is proving of great value, and is the more effective because there is hearty co-operation with the department of the Presbyterian Church dealing with social service, which is also admirably organized.

Rev. Hugh Dobson, who is one of the field secretaries of this department of the Methodist Church told the Times on Saturday some of the things that are being done, and they affect in the most intimate way the social welfare of the people.

Dr. Dobson spoke first of social surveys, both rural and urban, in which the department has been very active. In Regina a city cleaning day was projected in which the churches and schools took a very active part, and there was a very noticeable growth of civic spirit as a result.

The department urges every city as a first obligation to give adequate supervision to its health department, to provide medical inspection in schools, and also to have a city cleaning day. 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SCHOOLS AS SOCIAL CENTRES
Mr. Dobson says that Regina is building three new schools. The largest has been placed where the most poverty is found. It has twenty rooms and is one of the best in the province. It is opened in a few weeks. The new school is made for domestic science, manual training and medical and dental inspection. In the basement are shower baths, with separate dressing rooms for boys and girls. In the main part of the building an auditorium, ground floor and roof, taking the whole space to the roof, with a fine line of windows, is being seven hundred people, is provided. It is the purpose of the school board that this school building shall be opened every night, and the auditorium made a means of counteracting the influence of the saloons, the dance hall and other attractions of a less healthful character.

The superintendent, T. Perret, says that he will teach anything, the people need, as long as he can get a class and a teacher. It is proposed to install a first-class moving picture machine for educational purposes. Superintendent Perret proposes to have the city band visit the school and play on some evenings.

ings. Millinery and dressmaking classes have already been started. A very important feature is the teaching of English to adult foreigners. No less than one hundred and thirty-five were enrolled this winter. The school board insists that no single class shall be large. This work is of the very greatest value in assimilating the foreign element. In Moose Jaw last year seven hundred adults attended free

There is a Playgrounds Association in Regina, which co-operates with the school board. The ideal is that there should be a playground within six minutes walk of every child. One very important element in this work is supervision, and an appeal has been made to the normal schools in the western provinces to provide for the training of playground teachers. Mr. Dobson says that Canadian children do not know how to play, and that rightly supervised it can be made one of the greatest educational factors.

With regard to the situation in St. John, Mr. Dobson said that existing school buildings could easily be made available for social centre work by providing adjustable seats. It is easy to get all the equipment necessary to convert school buildings into social centres. There is also another important consideration. With regard to libraries, the tendency now is toward decentralization, and it is better to use a school building as a branch library than to erect a new one.

As an illustration of the very practical way in which the Methodist church department is setting about its social work, Mr. Dobson spoke of a week he spent in Prince Albert, speaking on Sunday and every night in the week on the Christian ideal as applied to the matters of town planning, housing conditions, social surveys, playgrounds, the care of the children, the subjects bearing directly on the social welfare of the community.

One cannot listen to Mr. Dobson without feeling that this new movement on the part of the churches is destined to have a great influence in bettering social conditions throughout the country. The general secretary of the Methodist department is Rev. Dr. Moore, and the field secretaries are Dr. Hazelwood, Rev. W. J. Smith, and Rev. Hugh Dobson.

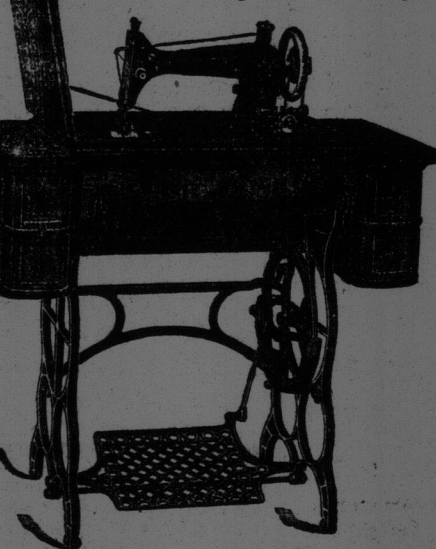

A telegram yesterday afternoon to His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc bore tidings of the death of Rev. Antoine Ouellette, a retired priest, formerly of the Cathedral, where he was rector for several years. The death took place at Edmonton, Madawaska county, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Gagnon, with whom he resided since his retirement from St. Joseph's church, Shediac, where he was parish priest for years, after his departure from St. John. He was in the vicinity of eighty years of age. He will be buried at Edmonton on Thursday.

ERRANT HUSBANDS IN CANADA

London, Jan. 20.—In an aggravated form, the problem of the errant husband in Canada, who is unwilling or unable to support his wife and family here, is being experienced this year.
