Is Nearing The End of His Days

O'Donovan Rossa Had Stormy Career in Advocating Ireland's Cause

Confined in a room in St. Vincent's Hospital, West New Brighton, Staten Island, lies Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa, once one of the best known agitators for the freedom of Ireland, a "physical force" man of the ultra type, whose name since 1880 has been familiar to Irishmen throughout the world. Long a thorn in the British legislative and for years a convict in English prisons, today his condition is such that it is only by great effort that he can be aroused from his bed.

It will be one year next July since O'Donovan Rossa was taken from his home at 124 Belmont terrace, New Brighton, Staten Island, to the hospital, suffering from the infirmities of old age. If he lives he will be eighty-two years old in September. He is the son of a poor fisherman in the poorest of the two-story houses in Richmond terrace, he had lived with his wife and daughters for fifteen years.

Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa was born September 10, 1831, at Ross Carberry, County Cork, Ireland, which was also the birthplace of Richard Croker and of the late Maurice J. Power, one of the right hand men of Grover Cleveland in New York. In June, 1868, Rossa married Miss Egan at Scherborn, Ireland. She died a few years later. On October 24, 1864, he married Margaret Jane Irwin at Clonsilla, County Cork. Their first child was born in Ireland, but twelve others claim New York city as their birthplace.

The eldest, a boy, was killed in an explosion in Mobile Bay during the civil war while on duty on a revenue cutter. Of four daughters living, two are graduate nurses employed in Manhattan, one is a stenographer in a Broadway business house, another is Mrs. John J. McIntyre, of Brooklyn, while a son, Jeremiah, is a dockerman in the Department of Docks. The other children are dead. Mrs. Rossa is now ill and has for some time been unable to leave her bed in the Richmond terrace home.

Rossa's aggressiveness brought him into trouble with the British government early in life. Some fifteen years ago, in speaking of his life and experiences, he said:

"Of the fact that I have lived my life I have no reason to complain. I have mixed my fortunes; given me a strong constitution, a light heart and a light pocket, making my struggle for existence active enough to keep the blood in a healthy state of circulation, fortifying me with strength to stand firm under difficulties and in the future I do all that I deem right in the present."

Sent to Prison. Rossa first ran foul of the British authorities in December, 1859, when he was charged with being implicated with others in the Irish Revolutionary Brotherhood, a Fenian organization of which the famous James Stephens was the head center and whose object was the upsetting of English authority in Ireland and the establishment of an independent government. He was arrested on a charge of treason and later he pleaded guilty and was released on his own recognizance.

Rossa continued his association with the Fenian movement and was active in furthering it in every way possible. In May, 1865, he came to New York for the purpose of conferring with Irishmen who were prominent in the Fenian circles in this country and obtaining funds for the furtherance of the work.

He returned home in August, having spent all his time in New York and in Philadelphia. While here he was much with such noted Fenian leaders as active Fenians as Gen. Thomas Francis Meagher, John O'Mahony, Richard O'Gorman, Robert E. Kelly, Captain Patrick J. Condon and Patrick J. Collins of Boston.

Immediately on his return to Ireland he resumed his activity in Fenianism. In September he was represented by charged with treason and placed in jail at Cork. His trial resulted in his being convicted and sentenced to penal servitude for life.

Then followed his confinement in the prisons of Pentonville, Mountjoy, Richmond, Chatham and Portland. The discipline in the last two being particularly strict. Rossa was not a submissive prisoner, but on the contrary a most refractory one, and according to his treatment more harshly than might otherwise have been the case.

Six years later he and certain other convicts were granted amnesty by order of Queen Victoria, and their sentence was changed from life imprisonment to banishment for twenty years. Rossa accepted the terms unconditionally.

Rossa, with four other Fenian convicts, Charles U. O'Connell, John Devoy, John McClure and Henry S. Mulleady, sailed from Liverpool for New York, January 19, 1871. Their coming had been widely proclaimed throughout the United States and great interest was shown therein by Irish sympathizers everywhere, as well as by politicians who were anxious to make capital out of their arrival.

The government through the collector of the port, showed its interest by having several officials meet their steamer at Quarantine with a revenue cutter and extend a welcome to the United States.
