THE SILVER LEAF TREE

An item in last evening's Times referred to Table Mountain at Cape Town, South Africa, and the very rare tree popularly called the silver leaf tree which grows on the northern side of its base. Curiously enough there are samples of the wonderful leaf of this tree in St. John. They are in possession of F. J. Hardiman of The Times' business staff. Mr. Hardiman's mother was born within sight of Table Mountain. Both he and his wife have relatives in Cape Colony. Samples of the silver leaf were brought to England by members of their families, and Mr. Hardiman has specimens in his home in St. John. The leaf is long and narrow, of a peculiarly beautiful satin-like surface, and is fringed on each side with short, fine hairs, the whole surface of the leaf showing a silvery sheen.

DEATHS IN THE CITY DURING 12 MONTHS WERE 40 FEWER THAN IN YEAR BEFORE

Total For Year Ended Oct. 31 Was 777—Greatest Number Was of Babies Less Than a Year Old—Tuberculosis Claimed Two More Than in 1913

During the year ended October 31, at the board of health offices 777 deaths were registered, a decrease of forty from the number recorded during the previous year. This report was submitted in the annual statement of T. M. Burns, secretary of the board, at the annual meeting held yesterday afternoon with M. W. Doherty presiding.

The report of the chief medical officer, Dr. C. G. Melvin, for the quarter, was presented. Four dealers in Kings county were notified that if they complied with the requirements of the board they could supply milk in the city, while four local men were reported for keeping cows without the sanction of the board. There were four citizens before the board for not complying with the regulations demanding sanitary conveniences on their premises.

Number of Deaths.
Tuberculosis claimed two more victims this year than last year, the totals being eighty-one and seventy-nine. The number of males who died last year was 429, and females 348, while this year the number of males was 380 and females 397. Canadian born totalled

FIRST SAILING OF TWO LINES CANCELLED

Two of the steamship lines operating to and from St. John announce cancellation of their opening sailings for the winter season. The steamer Virginian, although an Allan boat, had been chartered by the C. P. R. to open their winter service between Liverpool and St. John, sailing from Liverpool on Nov. 21, and from St. John on Dec. 4, but notice came to the local office last evening saying that this sailing had been cancelled. The Massanella will therefore be the first C. P. R. boat to take passengers from here, leaving on December 18.

The Robert Reford Company this morning also announced that their first sailing was cancelled, on account of the steamer Letitia, which was to open the service, having been requisitioned by the admiralty. The Letitia was to leave left Glasgow on Nov. 21 and St. John on Dec. 12.
