ONE CASE BEFORE COURT IN HAMPTON

Hampton, N. B., Sept. 30.-The Kings circuit court met today with His Honor Mr. Justice McKernan on the bench. The only case on the docket was that of David A. Hatfield against the Riddle Bobbin Lumber Co., a question of alleged trespass in occupation of property at Hatfield's Point, Bellefleur Bay, J. B. Baxter appeared for the plaintiff and G. W. Fowler, K. C. P. R. Taylor, E. C. Weyman and R. S. J. Freese for the defendant. The jury is composed of G. H. Barnes, W. J. Devine, Harry DeForest, Drury Hays, Forrest Cosman, R. Crawford and Harvey Baird. Mr. Baxter read the evidence of John M. Somerville taken last June in chambers before Justice Langry, which was admitted. He also submitted evidence showing the transfer of the property to the plaintiff. G. G. Scott, Campbell Smith, James Case, Samuel H. Burns, A. Urquhart and Abram W. Hatfield gave evidence touching boundaries and possession. At noon Judge McKernan adjourned the hearing until two o'clock, the court room being too hot to admit of a longer sitting. It is probable the case will be closed tomorrow, court sits until six o'clock this evening.

JURY DISAGREE

Travis Will Have To Undergo Trial Again. The jury in the case of King vs. Travis returned at 2:30 this afternoon and announced that they were hopelessly disagreed. They had been out since 12:30 o'clock. The prisoner was not admitted to bail. He will be tried again before this court adjourns. It was said that they stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction. Mrs. Travis, Mrs. Quinn, Mary Lorne, Mrs. Bent and Leonard Bent today testified for the defence. Mr. Mallin addressed the jury for the defence and the attorney-general for the crown.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 30.-Because of the postponement of account of rain, four events were on today's Grand Circuit card. A heavy track and threatening clouds however made racing uncertain.
