LEFT HER MONEY TO NATIONALISTS AND SOCIALISTS

Edinburgh, Scotland, Oct. 7.—Legacies were left the leaders of the Irish Nationalist party and the Socialist party by Mrs. Keenan, eighty-two years old, who died here recently. She left some \$38,000 in equal shares to John Redmond, Wm. Redmond and James Keir Hardie.

COMMON COUNCIL

The common council met this afternoon in City Hall and dealt with the report of the Commissioner of public safety presented a revised by-law relating to the fire department.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended that the tender of the H. Barr for material and work in placing pipes and radiators for the heating of the lunch rooms in Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 warehouses, Sand Point, be accepted; that he be authorized to have repairs proceeded with at the South Market Wharf at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.

The commissioner of public works reported purchase of the asphaltizing plant for \$826.90. He recommended that W. H. Coleman be granted the privilege of placing his lumber wagon at the corner of Union street and Rodney wharf, from November 1 to April 30 at \$25 for the term and that Alison & Thomas have permission to place an electrical sign over the door of their office 68 Prince William street.

The commissioner of finance and public affairs reported payments for September, amounting to \$52,257.25. He recommends that the assessment against the General Animals Insurance Company and the Travellers' Fire Insurance Company be written off; that against the Union London and Scottish Insurance Company and the British Union and National Insurance Company, stand as assessed; that the Canada Fire Insurance Company and the Canadian Fire Insurance Company pay pro rata according to the time they were doing business here this year; that \$50 be accepted from the Sterling Accident & Guarantee Company, and an amount on the remainder of the assessment pro rata according to the time the company was doing business in the city during the present year; that an act be prepared to amend the assessment law so as to provide that the taxes against insurance companies be due on Jan. 1 each year.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—Following investigations which have been made by officers of the Forestry Department it is proposed to set aside this year a number of new forest reserves. The largest is on the shores of Lesser Slave Lake, and comprises 4,788 square miles. About 350,000,000 feet of lumber is available there, and the reservation is recommended because of the unsuitability of the land for agricultural purposes and the necessity of conserving a timber supply for the future.

North of Lake is Biehe, another reserve is suggested. In Saskatchewan a reserve has been recommended at Port a la Corne, while one in Manitoba is likely to be established. It is intended to extend considerably this year the pine tree reserve north of Prince Albert, and also those in British Columbia.

LOCAL GREEKS LEAVE

Several of the local Greeks who are returning home to fight for their country, will leave for New York this evening. The Sun says: "One great truth about the present situation is that a large number of eminent gentlemen in the financial world are finding themselves without stocks."

New York, Oct. 7.—Financing ahead is a guarantee of support for the stock market on the decline.

A political scare is predicted before November 5 by important stock exchange houses. In some quarters of the street much higher rates for money are expected during a flurry.

Generally, commission houses are recommending purchases on reactions. Some of them suggest the developing of a trading market.

Democratic politicians are reported in a Washington dispatch as preparing to use the senate committee campaign contribution evidence in the presidential fight.

"The market will digest the heavy foreign selling before broadly advancing to higher levels," says a veteran operator. There are indications that the short interest has materially increased. Investigations indicate that the public is increasing its interest. Many new securities are being opened in commission houses.
