

Mourn Her Dead

Funeral of the Late M. Felix Faure Takes Place in Paris.

A Magnificent Pageant Remains to the Tomb.

Paris, Feb. 23.—Crowds of anxious to witness the funeral which was to bear the remains late President Faure from the palace, where they have been to be followed from the place to the cemetery of St. Anne.

Some of the people took up positions at midnight, and by 9 o'clock the funeral procession had gathered along the Champs Elysee, and Place de la Concorde.

At 9:30 various societies' wreaths arrived and were followed by detachments of the St. Cyr, Polytechnic and other academies, and by detachments of the army, navy and other branches of the military service.

The members of the chamber of deputies headed by the president of the house, M. Deschanel, arrived at the palace at 9:55 a.m., and were followed by the troops drawn up there, flying the French flag.

The newly-elected President M. Emile Loubet, then drove to a stand and held the cortege in honor, and was accompanied by General Bloyet, Duke of Angoulême, grand chancellor of the Legion of Honor, and escorted by a squadron of artillery, mounted on the late president's carriage.

The procession started from the palace at 10:45, headed by General Bloyet, military governor of Paris, followed by the bearers of wreaths from the late president's household and the legionnaires, then "present arms" rang out, and the band of the Republican Guard played the national anthem.

Next came President Loubet, accompanied by Acting President Félix Faure and Chamberlain Premier Daguin, and President of the Chamber of Deputies M. Deschanel. After them came the officers of the late president's household, the Papal Nuncio and members of the diplomatic corps.

Following the foreign missions members of the senate and the chamber of deputies, and the army and navy, the council of the courts of cassation and appellate courts, and other public bodies followed.

Strong Bodies of Troops were interspersed throughout the cortege. The whole route was covered by police. The procession, crowded with thousands of people, moved slowly toward the cathedral, where the bodies of the late president were carried by the corps of gendarmes.
