SHEFFIELD ST. WOMEN IN COURT TODAY

One Pays \$100 for Illegal Liquor Selling

Other Remanded; Sardinian Man Tells All He Knows; Called Policeman a Bushman and Was Charged With Precaution.

There was rather a busy session in the police court this morning and a number of cases were quickly dealt with.

There were four Saturday drunks and two Sunday drunks. The latter two were only 19 years of age. Two of the Saturday arrests left deposits of eight dollars each and the money went to the city treasury.

Louis Golding, who claimed South Africa as his native land, pleaded guilty to being drunk but not to being a bushman. Policeman Sives told of finding Golding asleep on a King Square bench about noon Saturday. The defendant hid his shoes off and when awakened and given a chance to go to his boarding house, he became profane and called the policeman a bushman. The magistrate told Golding he was liable to a fine of \$10. The police often have an unpleasant duty to perform and do not get so very much pay, and they should not be subjected to such remarks from any party. The prisoner was fined \$8 which he said.

A drunk from Eastport, Me., was gathered in on Brittain street shortly after the arrival of the steamer R. B. Fuller from Boston. In court this morning he was very talkative despite the warning of his honor that what he said might be taken down and read in the press. He said the sardinian factor in which he worked was shut down for a few days and so intended making the round trip for pleasure and while in St. John he was to look up about a dozen young women to start drinking coming here on the steamer and got drunk. He said he wished to thank the police for taking care of him when he was incapable of taking care of himself. He said he had a wife and five children and would not want to let the wife know where he was. He said he would mail the money immediately on his return. The magistrate allowed him to go this time and take the four dollars which he had saved by not being fined and buy something nice for his family. The sardinian man left with many thanks.

James Lewis, a 19 year old Picton, N. S., youth, pleaded guilty to being drunk on Brunsell street and in court this morning gave evidence that he purchased a flask of whiskey for 25 cents from a colored woman in a Sheffield street house about noon Saturday. Maggie McLeod, a colored woman who keeps a house on Sheffield street, was brought into court and identified by Lewis as the person who sold the liquor to him. The woman testified that she never saw Lewis in her life and that she could prove that she was not at the stand and was fined \$100, which she promptly paid and departed.

The two youths with the McLeod woman were remanded to jail.

N. Jacobson pleaded not guilty to allowing two teams loaded with scrap iron to remain on the Government grounds all of one night and part of the next day. He said the material belonged to the Dominion Iron and Metal Co. Jacobson put the two following questions to I. C. R. Officer Smith:

"Do you, are sure that I left the wagons there for scrap?"

"How do you believe that I not let dem wagons there?"

Policeman Smith could not answer the questions and the magistrate said the official had not made out a case against the Jew, the case was dismissed.

Robert Garnett, charged with being disorderly and assaulting his son, was fined \$20, which was allowed to stand pending his future conduct.

Samuel Hector, charged with assault, was fined \$20, but the fine was allowed to stand against him.

BOTH PARTIES READY FOR TOMORROW'S FRAY

Much Oratory Will Mark Close of Campaign.

Meeting Planned - by Government and Opposition for This Evening.

But one more day remains for campaigning for tomorrow is polling day. Both government and opposition are warning to the fray as the day of election draws nigh. On Saturday there were clashes of meetings in both Lorneville and St. Martins, and for tonight both sides have announced meetings in St. Martins.

On Saturday government orators addressed meetings in five different places in St. John county. The opposition speakers held forth on three different platforms on the same occasion.

For this evening the opposition have advertised three meetings, while the government have also arranged for meetings.

At St. Martins the speakers at the government meeting in the Temperance Hall were Hon. John Morrissey, Hon. Robert Macdonald, Hon. W. C. H. Gimmer, the candidate, J. P. Mosher, and G. E. Logan. Capt. Carson occupied the chair. The opposition meeting at the same place was addressed by Hon. F. J. Sweeney, J. P. Tweedie, M. P. P., and E. H. McAlpine, M. P. C. It is stated by independent parties that the opposition meeting in the Masonic Hall was much better attended than that of the government.

At Lorneville the clash between the two meetings according to the supporters of the opposition was caused by the government party insisting on holding a meeting in the Orange Hall, although it had consented to allow the opposition the date for a meeting in Public Hall. The government's supporters employed a life and drum band to attract the crowd to their meeting. The government speakers were W. F. Hatway, M. P. P., and F. McSproul M. P. P. Those for the opposition were Copp, M. M. P., and Dr. Letha Curran, Fallville.

At Beausfield the opposition speakers were ex-Premier Robinson and J. R. Beyer. At Musquash, however, H. A. Powell, K. C., and Dr. Mullin, K. C., were the orators who presented the government's side of the case. At Dipper Harbor, J. A. Murray, M. P. P., and Dr. A. W. MacRae, K. C., spoke in the government interest, while Premier Hazen and Dr. J. P. McInerney addressed the meeting in Beausfield Hall, Musquash. There was a fair attendance at all the meetings.

This evening Dr. MacRae and Mr. Sweeney looked to speak at St. Martins and will meet with opposition in a double sense from speakers to be met that place by the other party. At Musquash, Messrs. Tweedie and McAlpine are to advance reasons for Dr. Benthley's election, and in Fallville Orange Hall Hon. Mr. Robinson, Hon. Mr. Sweeney and Mr. Copp will do the same. It is likely that both parties will hold meetings in addition to those advertised.

ADMIRE BEAUTIES OF ST. JOHN RIVER

Among those who are making their summer homes at Brown's Flats this season is Dr. E. G. S. Draper, of Philadelphia. Dr. Draper is not a new comer, as he has been in the habit of spending three months annually on the St. John River for several years past. His wife was a native of Holderville and is buried there.

In the Quaker City Dr. Draper is known as one of its largest practitioners of medicine. His staff includes a dozen doctors and nurses. He is an Englishman who has been very successful in the United States, London having been his birth place. In his mastery branch of the profession, he has by far the largest practice in Philadelphia.

Dr. Draper is intensely interested in the advancement of Brown's Flats toward recognition as a beautiful vacation place. He takes an active part in the affairs of the Long Reach Outing Association, and was one of the officials and prize-givers for Saturday's sports. Dr. Draper is not slow to express his opinion that the St. John River can claim the finest aggregation of scenic beauties which are to be found together on the continent.

DEATH OF FRANK MUNROE, FORMERLY OF THIS CITY

"As a result of accidentally choking on some cherries he was eating, Frank Munroe, who ran a cigar stand at the foot of Columbia street, passed away at the city hospital June 17. As soon as the accident occurred Mr. Munroe was taken from his stand and hurried to the hospital where an operation failed to relieve the trouble. Deceased was 42 years of age and lived with his sister, Miss Alice Munroe, at 423 Whitman Avenue. The above was taken from "Fremont College's" Fremont, Seattle, Washington, of June 25, 1909. Mr. Munroe at one time ran a trunk factory on Princess street.
