Whiteside was accompanied to the island by George Burton and R. D. Cole. Should a skating meet be held in Montreal, St. John will be well represented. Logan also plans to attend the big American meets at Saranac Lake and other centres.

Owing to the absence of ice, curling is at a stand still in St. John. Besides the numerous outside matches, three regular contests are depending on the weather. The Thistle-Carlton match has been once postponed and unless a cold spell sets in the St. Andrew's Thistle match cannot be played on Saturday. The Carlton-St. Andrew's match has also been held up through the lack of ice.

WINTER PORT NOTES

C. P. R. steamer Montezuma, from London via Antwerp, was reported 110 miles out at 9:30 o'clock this morning. She will dock at Sand Point about 9 o'clock tonight. The Montezuma is bringing a large general cargo and one hundred passengers.

Two Allan liners will reach port about Saturday. The Corsican is bringing passengers and mails from Liverpool. The Corinthian has a heavy cargo and a large passenger list.

The Allan Liner Hesperian, now in port, will sail on Friday under C. P. R. charter. The bookings for the steamer are coming in rapidly.

BURGLARS ENTER A BAY SHORE COTTAGE

Door Pried Open and Considerable Damage Done to Inside of Building.

The usual stories of damage to summer cottages at Duck Cove and along the Bay Shore have already begun. The Scammell cottage on the road known as Pleasant street at Bay Shore was recently broken into at night, the back door being pried open either with a knife or other sharp steel instrument and considerable damage done to the inside of the cottage. The cottage is some distance away from any now occupied during the winter months, and although the intruders caused considerable commotion among the dogs of the neighborhood, they were not seen by anyone. MAYOR BULLOCK MAY RUN AS ALDERMAN AT LARGE
