## TOTAL REVENUE

\$230,000,000

Splendid Showing by Cana-  
dian Government—Revenue\$100,000,000 in Ex-  
cess of Revenue Two Years

Ago.

Ottawa, April 1.—The Dominion  
financial year closed yesterday and  
although accurate figures will not be  
available for some time it is stated  
that the revenue will be about \$230,  
000,000. This is one hundred mil-  
lions in excess of the federal revenue  
two years ago, which is a marvellous  
rate of increase. Despite the increase  
in pensions and interest on loans  
there will be a surplus of fifty million  
dollars to devote to capital expendi-  
ture or war costs.The trade of the Dominion has also  
increased at an extraordinary rate.  
The aggregate trade will exceed two  
billion which is about double what  
it was two years ago.The trade balance in favor of Can-  
ada will be about \$350,000,000.

## SATURDAY FIRES.

An alarm from box 8 about 11.40  
o'clock Saturday night took the  
department to the C. P. R. boarding  
house 4 to 6 North street. The fire  
was in one of the rooms on the upper  
floor. No great damage was done.On Saturday afternoon the fire de-  
partment on the West side were called  
to Mrs. Haley's house, St. James  
street. The overturning of an oil  
stove caused slight damage.Water getting into some time stored  
on the top flat of the Standard  
Creamery building, 159 Main street,  
and owned by J. E. Cowan, called out  
the firemen shortly after noon Satur-  
day. The fire caught some old base  
piled up near the time and caused a  
great quantity of smoke. No damage  
was done.

## BUILDING PERMITS.

The value of building permits for  
the month of March, issued by the  
building inspector, total \$277,200, as  
compared with \$29,500 for March, 1916.  
Two hundred and sixty thousand dol-  
lars of the month's total is to be  
credited to the new C. G. R. elevator  
to be erected on Water street, leav-  
ing a balance of \$17,200 for other  
buildings.

The totals for the first three months

of 1917 were \$34,500, and for the cor-  
responding period of this year 1916,  
\$500. Of this latter amount \$340,000  
is to be credited to the Canadian  
Government as follows: Elevator,  
\$20,000, and West Side sheds,  
\$30,000.

## NEW LANCASTER SCHOOL.

Contracts for the building of the  
new Lancaster school building were  
let Saturday morning. P. Neil Brodie  
is the architect. The mason work on  
the building was let to Grant &  
Horne, J. M. Belyea secured the  
carpenter work and G. & E. Blake  
the plumbing and heating for the pro-  
posed building. William E. Demings  
was awarded the contract for painting  
and glazing. The building, when com-  
pleted, will cost about \$25,000.The contractors will start the  
masonry work in connection with the  
foundation this week. It is stipulated  
that the building be completed and  
ready for use on November 1.

## PROBATE COURT.

The will of Miss Ann Charters Sym-  
monds has been admitted to probate  
by Judge McInerney. The will includ-  
ed bequests of real or personal prop-  
erty to the value of \$1,000 to the  
Dioscean Fund, to be paid within ten  
years; also the sum of \$50 to be paid  
annually; a like bequest to the Church  
of England Institute for a building  
fund, or for the purchase of a build-  
ing, and also the sum of \$50 to be  
applied, one-half for repairs to St.  
Paul's church and the other half for  
benefit of St. Barnabas' Chapel; also  
the sum of \$25 annually until the be-  
quest is paid. The testator made a  
number of minor bequests to relatives  
and devised the residue of real estate  
to be held for the benefit of her sister,  
Miss Fannie Symonds, during her life,  
and after her death for her other sur-  
viving sisters, and after their death  
the property to be sold and divided  
equally among her cousins, M. Cor-nelli Symonds, R. Hibbert Symonds  
and C. E. Arthur Symonds. Miss  
Fanny Symonds, Elizabeth Nesles and  
G. E. Arthur Symonds were appoint-  
ed executors and trustees under the  
will, and were sworn in as such. The  
total probate value of the estate is  
\$13,685, of which \$7,500 is real estate.  
Dr. J. Roy Campbell, K. C., is pro-
