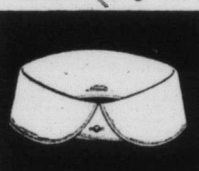

West Lorne council paid \$245.40 at
its last meeting for oil for the streets.
In the past six months autos have
killed 122 persons on the streets of
New York.

Cut down expenses and pay more
taxes is the resolution passed by Lon-
don financiers.

There were 18 applications for
teacher in Junior room of the Park-
hill public school.

The Nicholson planing mills at
Strathroy have received a war order
for 10,000 high explosive 4.5 shell
boxes.

With a number of remote polls to
hear from, the prohibition vote in
Alberta stands 42,706 for and 22,718
against.

T. H. Follick, M. A., who was en-
gaged as principal of Watford High
School at a salary of \$1,500, has taken
another principalship at an increase of
\$100.

The southern terminal of the North-
ern Navigation Company's passenger
steamers Noronic, Huronic and Ham-
onic has been changed from Sarnia to
Windsor and Detroit.

The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs.
H. A. Gilroy, south of Alvinston, fell
beneath a load of hay and was run
over, on Wednesday. She is now in a
dangerous condition.

F. W. Willson, of the law firm of
Moncrieff & Willson, has been ap-
pointed to the position of police magis-
trate at Petrolia made vacant through
the death of the late C. Mackenzie.

An epidemic of typhoid is prevalent
among the children who have been at-
tending the school at Northcote, and
the medical health officer attributes it
to an unsanitary pump at the school.

Harwich township Board of Health
has ordered all schools situated in
Harwich to provide means by which
children attending school may wash
their hands and dry them during the
day.

Two farmers of Dover were fined \$25
and costs for travelling a stallion that
had not been registered. The informa-
tion was laid by an inspector of the
live stock branch of the department of
agriculture.

Miss Elva Matthews is the winner
of the Ross prize at Strathroy at the
recent High School entrance examina-
tion. She was prepared at the Mait-
land Street School, Strathroy, by
Thomas Dunsmore.

Daniel Black, of Dutton, received
word from the head office of the Cana-
da Life Insurance Company that he
has written the most of all the dis-
trict agents for the first six
months of this year.

The Dutton High School Board has
engaged Miss Mary Graham, of Toron-
to, as teacher of moderns, in place
of Miss Marjorie Ross, who resigned
to accept a position in the Wieland
High School. There were 30 appli-
cants, of whom 22 were specialists.

Walter Robinson, son of Principal
W. G. Robinson, of Melbourne, won
the Ross prize given to the candi-
date taking the highest standing at
the entrance examination held at that
centre. The winner was prepared by
Miss Sarah Beattie at the Melbourne
Continuation School.

Many complaints have been received
by fruit inspectors of poorly filled
strawberry boxes, and in consequence
the inspectors have been instructed to
watch closely and have offenders
prosecuted. A poorly filled berry box
has no place, and it is up to the
grower to cut out the practice entirely.

The death occurred at the hospital
at New Liskeard, on Wednesday, of
Mrs. Ethel McMillan, wife of James G.
McMillan, inspector of mines for the
Cobalt district, and formerly of Dun-
wich. She was taken ill on Thursday
and underwent an operation on Fri-
day, but owing to the serious nature
of her illness she did not recover from
the shock. The deceased was 37 years
of age and a daughter of the late Dun-
can McLean, of Aldborough.

The total population of Canada at
the beginning of the present year,
according to an official estimate made
by the Census Department, was 8,075,
000. This is the first time that the
eight million mark has been passed,
and in the total was included, of
course, Canada's soldiers at the front.

The growth of population since the
census was taken in 1911 is officially
estimated at approximately \$80,000, or
an average of about 200,000 per year.

Thomas Dunsmore has been principal
of Strathroy's public schools for
over thirty years, and during that
long period of service, has taught
pupils even unto the third generation.
Miss Mary Armstrong has a longer
period of faithful service to her credit,
beginning her career in Strathroy
some years earlier than Mr. Duns-
more. Miss Mary Stevenson, too, has
been a member of the Strathroy
teaching staff for about twenty-five
years.

George Armitage, tobacconist, aged
42 years, of St. Thomas, was instantly
killed Sunday afternoon, when his
automobile turned turtle on the road
near Ridgetown. With him in the
car were Mrs. Armitage and Clyde
Kroker, the latter an auto machinist
and expert chauffeur, and his wife,
Mrs. Kroker. The men were in the
front seat and Kroker was driving.
The front wheels dropped into a deep
rut and in turning out the car slipped
on the clay road and overturned,
throwing all of the party clear except
Mr. Armitage, who fell beneath the
car and was crushed to death, his
neck being broken.

DEATH OF MRS. DUNLOP

Wife of West Middlesex Registrar
Passes Away at Glencoe.

In the death, which occurred at her
home here on Sunday afternoon, of
Christina Campbell, wife of Mr. Rich-
ard Dunlop, Registrar for West Mid-
dlesex, Glencoe and vicinity loses one
of its most prominent and highly es-
teemed citizens, and a family are
sorely bereaved of a loving wife and
mother.

Mrs. Dunlop was 60 years of age and
was a daughter of the late John Camp-
bell, of Delaware, who taught school
there for many years. She was mar-
ried to Mr. Dunlop in 1873 and leaves
a family of one son and three daughters
—Robert J., of the National Refining
Company, Toronto; Mrs. R. W. Gough
and Mrs. K. M. Byron, of Mount
Clemens, Michigan, and Mrs. T. W.
Burles, of Cowley, Alberta. She also
leaves one brother, Howard Campbell,
of High Bluff, Manitoba, and one sis-
ter, Mrs. James W. Campbell, of Van-
couver.

Mr. and Mrs. Dunlop resided at Nap-
ier up to about three years ago, when
they moved to Glencoe on Mr. Dun-
lop's being appointed to the position
of registrar of deeds. About two
years ago Mrs. Dunlop was taken with
an illness that gradually undermined
her constitution, and despite the best
efforts of physicians and surgeons no
permanent relief could be given.

Mrs. Dunlop was a lady very
highly esteemed by a large circle of
friends and acquaintances, and had up
to her illness always taken an active
and prominent part in church and
kindred work. She was particularly
interested in the work of the Women's
Christian Temperance Union, being
the first county president of this or-
ganization in Middlesex. Her work
in this connection took her to many
parts of the province as a leader in
various conventions. She was also
prominently identified with White
Ribbon work.

Mrs. Dunlop was a member of the
Church of England, and the funeral
service on Tuesday was conducted in
St. John's church by the rector, Rev.
C. H. P. Owen. There was a large at-
tendance, particularly of many old
friends from Napier and vicinity.

The pallbearers were John Hughes,
Mr. John Hughes, jr., J. B. Gough, Ed.
deGex, Wm. Toohill and George
Lewis. Among the many magnificent
floral tributes were wreaths from the
W. C. T. U., the Ladies' Guild and the
National Refining Company.

GLENCOE BOY APPOINTED

Col. A. D. McRae Head of Canadian
Army Service Corps in Britain.

Col. A. D. McRae, son of Mrs. Mary
McRae, of Glencoe, has been gazetted
in London, England, as head of the
Canadian Army Service Corps. He
will take over and consolidate the
units which are at present looking
after the large Dominion battalions in
England and will be assisted in the
work by British experts.

He will be supreme purchasing
agent in London for all supplies
needed. Tuesday he started on a tour
of British establishments, accompanied
by Capt. Hogarth, Toronto, who has
joined his staff.

Hitherto the Canadian Army Ser-
vice Corps, particularly those in
France, have been under and worked
with the British organization.
