ritation of the past, which was generated in the struggle for freedom - and the triumph of the consciousness of the ethnical oneness and brotherhood of the two nations occupying this continent, - with one another that the Nother Country.

It would be a manifestation to the world of the power of the Spirit of Peace among the peoples speaking our language and holding our traditions.

It would be a magnificent demonstration of the mutual feeling of kindness and good will which would make the members of the Great Family look upon ar among them as an intolerable barbarism. An inhuman outrage upon the human race.

Who so well fitted as the Son of Albert and Victoria
to be the Patron and Representative of such a message to the
nations of the world?
