3708—**MATHEWS, REV. CHARLES**—First Classical Master U.C.C., 1829-43—He received his primary education at the well-known Bluecoat School in London, Eng., and on 21st Sept., 1829, was preacher at the Annual Commencement of that institution, held at Christ Church, Newgate. He was an M.A. of Cambridge, a brilliant classical and Hebrew scholar, winning the Tyrwhitt Hebrew scholarship of the university. He was Acting Principal of U.C.C., 1838-9, and again in 1843. From the latter year until 1877 Mr. Mathews lived in the Island of Guernsey. In 1867 he published at London a poetical translation of Horace's Odes, Epodes, and Carmen Saeculare. 3709—**ROWSSELL, HENRY**—Bookseller and Publisher, Toronto—Mr. Rowsell, who was born in London, Eng., February, 1806, emigrated to Canada in 1833, commencing business two years later on King street west, Toronto. In 1840 he entered into partnership with his brother, William Rowsell, who died about 1848, and the business was carried on by the surviving partner till 1875, when the firm became Rowsell & Hutchison. In 1880 Mr. Rowsell retired from the business, which was continued by his partner, the late Mr. Henry Hutchison, at the old stand, 74-6 King street east, in the Wellington Buildings, until his death in 1909, when the business was closed. Mr. Rowsell was one of the founders of the Toronto Board of Trade, and treasurer of the House of Industry and St. George's Society for many years. His death took place in Toronto, 29th July, 1890. 3710—**FOTHERGILL, CHARLES**—Publisher U.C. Gazette and Weekly Register, York—He belonged to a distinguished Quaker family of Yorkshire, Eng.; came to Canada in 1819, and from 1822-6 published the Gazette and Weekly Register. In the latter year the Register disappeared and the U.E. Loyalist took its place. For expressing independent opinions in the Register, Sir Peregrine Maitland dismissed Mr. Fothergill as King's Printer in 1826, after which he published for a time the "Palladium," composed of scientific, literary and general matter. As a scientist and naturalist he was well known, and is said to have written extensively on birds and animals of this continent. At different times he was a member of the Legislature of Upper Canada. In conjunction with Dr. Dunlop and Dr. Rees it was the intention of Mr. Fothergill to establish at York a Museum of National and Civil History, but the plan did not materialize. For several years "The York Almanac and Royal Calendar" was published by Mr. Fothergill. Water color from oil portrait in possession of Mrs. J. A. McGillivray, Toronto. Size 3 x 4. 3711—**CUMBERLAND, LIEUT.-COL. F. W.**—Engineer and Architect of Note—Engaged in the construction of various railways in England. Attached, 1843-7, to the engineering department of the Admiralty, having to do with the construction of harbors, docks and other Government works at Chatham and Portsmouth. Resigned to come to Canada, and very shortly after his arrival was appointed engineer to the County of York. In 1851 succeeded Hon. H. C. Seymour as engineer-in-chief of the Northern Railway. Successfully completed the road, and during its progress established the harbor and founded the town of Collingwood. Reorganized the Northern in 1859, becoming managing director; also reorganized the Port Hope Railway. Water color. Size 3 x 4. Head and shoulders. See 1004.

3712—**CUMBERLAND, F. BARLOW, 1846-1914**—Freight and Passenger Agent, Northern Railway. One of the founders of the Niagara Navigation Co. Water color. Size 3 x 4. Head and shoulders. See 1031.
