EDITORIAL NOTES &c.

1. THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OUR FINANCIAL ECONOMY.—We are instructed by the President of the Conference, to give notice that the first meeting of this highly important Committee will be held in the Halifax Brunswick Street Church School Room, on Friday afternoon, the 21st of June, at 2 o'clock, instead of on Monday, the 24th, as published in the Minutes.

The reason of the change is, that it is thought that a single day would be utterly inadequate for the right accomplishment of the work which has been assigned to this Committee. That work, according to the published Minutes of Conference for 1871, page 49, is "to consider the whole Financial Economy of the Conference, and to suggest, after due deliberation, any changes which may seem to promote and advance the interests of Methodism throughout the Conference." For such a work the time, from the Friday afternoon above named until the opening of the regular Conference Committees on Tuesday will be scarcely long; it is therefore to be earnestly hoped that every member of the Committee will make his arrangements to give his attendance at the earlier time now appointed.

2. CIRCUIT SCHEDULES.—We are requested to call the special attention of all the Superintendents of Circuits throughout the Conference to the regulation which requires the CIRCUIT SCHEDULES which are appended to the *Books of Accounts* which have been sent to them, to be carefully filled up and sent to the Financial Secretaries of the Districts at least one week before the time appointed for the Annual District Meetings.

This is necessary in order that the Secretaries may be properly prepared to facilitate the transaction of the business of the District Committees, and to ensure accuracy in our General Statistics.

If any Superintendent should fail to discharge his duty in this respect, his delinquency should be reported through the District to the Conference.

3. ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.—(1.) We received a few days since, we suppose from the Author, Mr. D. B. Newcomb, of Cornwallis, a copy of a pamphlet of about 70 pages, bearing the title, "How to Win; or the DYNAMIS OF LABOR." Suggestions to Young Men, in Three Lectures, for the Encouragement of Agriculture and the Industrial Arts."

The title is a taking one, and the object of the author seems to be truly patriotic; and we do not at all care for a perusal of this very neatly got up pamphlet would do our young men throughout Nova Scotia not harm but good. We advise them, therefore, to call at Mackinnay's of Buckley's Bookstore and purchase copies of it as soon as possible.

(2.) We should have acknowledged two or three weeks since the receipt of a copy of the *Fourth Annual Report of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb at Halifax, N. S., for 1871.* When it came to hand we laid it aside hoping to find opportunity to examine it in the course of a few days. We have not however yet found that opportunity; but we are sure from our acquaintance with those who are responsible for the management of the Institution, that they are using to the best advantage possible the quite too small means which are placed in their power for promoting the interests of the Deaf and Dumb, not only of Nova Scotia, but also of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Surely these three Provinces uniting in this benevolent work ought to be able to create and equip an Institution which would compare well with any similar Institution on this continent. The excellent Principal ought to have a much better building or set of Buildings than he now has which to carry on the truly philanthropic enterprise in which he is engaged for these Provinces.

(3.) HARRIS'S MAGAZINE for May has reached our table in good time. It is full of highly attractive reading matter, profusely illustrated. Those who are acquainted with the most popular periodical do not need to be told how richly it is wont to be freighted with literary excellence and artistic beauty; and no description which we could give in one of our newspapers could serve to give anyone who is not acquainted with it a correct idea of its characteristics in these respects.

(4.) LADIES' REPOSITORY AND HOME MAGAZINE for May.—This in our estimation is a more desirable visitant for Christian families, also before us for the month which shows legions of a most tempting table of contents and two beautiful engravings and a few other illustrations.

(5.) CAMP MEETING.—We commend Bro. Hennessey of the arrangements which he has made for a Camp Meeting in July at the attention of all who wish to see the cause of experimental religion promoted throughout these Provinces. We hope to have an opportunity to say something more upon this subject hereafter.
