County Rate Higher.
The County of Bruce is becoming very expensive to maintain, the County Council have decided to levy about \$15,000 more than last year to meet the increased expenses. Carrick's County rate this year will be about two and two thirds mills on the dollar, the amount to be raised in this township being \$7,000.

The Late Michael Wagner.

The official closing is set for June 30, but it is expected that many of the youngsters will get ahead of the schedule and have a few days' extra holidays. The entrance examinations are set for June 26, 27 and 28. The promotion examinations will be held at the same time, so that it is not at all probable that much work will be done the last two days of school.

Cowardly Conduct.
Three or four young men of this village were guilty of an act last Friday night that has made all respectable citizens ashamed of them. While two of the Walkerton rooters were starting off for home about eleven o'clock, they were treated to a shower of stale eggs, nearly all of which took effect. This method of obtaining revenge is too cowardly and contemptible altogether, and if the assaulted parties wish to obtain the names of the culprits, for the purpose of prosecution, the officials of the Mildmay football club will lend every assistance in their power to that end.

May Muzzie Dogs Again.
With the approach of the hot weather and consequent danger of rabies in cases where people are bitten by dogs, it is very probable that the Provincial Board of Health will again order that all dogs in the province must be muzzled during the summer months. Already several cases of dog bites have been reported, and as there were so few cases reported last summer when all dogs were muzzled, it is expected that a similar order will be issued shortly. Orders have been issued that all dogs in Scarborough township must be kept on chain for ten days as a result of a bite inflicted by an animal on Gordon Henderson at Agincourt.

Working the Public.
An old German organ cleaner, who hails from Clifford, has been "doing" up some of the people on the 1st and 2nd concessions recently. He carries his working tools in a cigar box, and is quite a smooth talker, so he found customers in plenty. The bride was beautifully attired in a dress of Duchess satin, with bridal veil and orange blossoms, and carried a bouquet of bridal roses. The happy young couple left on the afternoon train for Goderich to spend a short honeymoon, after which they will settle down at St. Jacobs' where they will be at home to their friends after July 20th. The bride was only of Mildmay's most popular young ladies, and on the evening previous to her marriage was made the recipient of a beautiful silver cake plate, by the members of the Y. P. A. The Late August Pross sr.
The remains of the late August Pross sr., who passed away at Berlin on Friday last, were brought to Mildmay last Saturday, and interred in the Evangelical Cemetery on Sunday afternoon. Deceased was an old and highly respected resident of Carrick for many years. Recently he has been making his home with his son-in-law, Mr. Jacob Weigand of Berlin. The cause of his death was senile decay, having reached the age of 78 years. He leaves four sons and three daughters to mourn his death. They are—David, John and Fernando in the West, August at Mildmay, Mrs. Unger and Mrs. Weigand of Berlin, and Mrs. W. G. Liesemer of Didsbury, Alta.

The football match played here last Friday evening between Walkerton and Mildmay Intermediates, was an excellent exhibition of the game, clean, fast football being played from start to finish. The victory was won by Mildmay by a score of 1 to 0, thus tying up the district. Mildmay's goal was the result of a penalty kick, which was converted by Chas. Pletsch. Walkerton also had a penalty in the first half, but Goalkeeper Carroll succeeded in preventing a score. There was a good attendance, and the game passed off smoothly, under the management of Referee Ducker of Galt. This victory for Mildmay placed both teams on an equal footing, both as to games and goals, and the rules state that the tie must be broken by playing extra time after the last game. This Walkerton objected strenuously to, and the locals agreed to play home and home games to decide the winner, the dates to be at Walkerton June 19th, and Mildmay June 26th.

Carrying out the above agreement the Mildmay club journeyed to Walkerton on Monday evening of this week, to again try conclusions with the County towners. CARRICK COUNCIL.

Carrick Council met this day pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Miller—Waack—That the sum of \$100 be expended in graveling the Culross townline,—\$40 between Lot 1 and 5; and \$60 between Lots 20 and 27, provided the Culross Council supplement a like amount.—Carried.

Mr. D. Robertson appeared on behalf of the Walkerton Electric Light Company, asking for this council's consent to erect a dam on the Saugeen River near the Brant—Carrick townline. It was explained that a portion of the unopened road allowance between the two townships, amounting to about half an acre, would be flooded by the erection of the said dam, and the Company made the proposition to pay the Township \$25 for Carrick's interest in the said portion of the roadway to be flooded. The townline is unopened and untravelled, and is not used as a public highway, and it is not likely to be ever opened up.

Schmidt—Waack—That this Council agrees to accept the said proposition, in consideration of the sum of \$25, and that a by-law be passed confirming this agreement.—Carried.

By-laws No. 12 and 13 were read a first time.

Miller—Schnurr—That by-laws be read a second and third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Miller—Schnurr—That the sum of \$20 be expended on Div. No. 36, under the supervision of Councillor Waack.—Carried.

Schmidt—Schnurr—That the Reeve and Coun. Waack be a committee to let the contract of graveling 10th sideroad between Cons. 4 and 6.—Carried.

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
