BURNS' FAREWELL

A Farewell to the Brethren of St.
James' Lodge, Toronto

(Burns: born 1759—died 1796)

The following lines were spoken to
the Brethren by the poet while on
the eve of his intended emigra-
tion. The person specially alluded
to in the last verse was the Master
of the Lodge, Maj.-Gen. Sir James
Montgomery:

Adieu! a heart-warm fond adieu!
Dear brothers of the mystic tie!
Ye favored, ye enlightened few,
Companions of my social joy!
Though I to foreign lands must hie,
Pursuing Fortune's sly'dry ba,*
With melting heart, and brimful eye
I'll mind you still, though far awa.

Off have I met your social band
And spent the cheerful, festive night;
Off honored with supreme command,
Presided o'er the sons of light.
And by that hieroglyphic bright,
Which none but craftsmen ever saw,
Strong Memory on my heart shall
write

Those happy scenes, when far awa
May freedom, harmony and love
Unite you in the grand design,
Beneath the Omnipotent eye above,
The glorious Architect Divine—
That you may keep the unerring line
Still rising by the plummet's law,
Till order bright completely shine,
Shall be my prayer when far awa.

And you, farewell, whose merits
claim
Justly, the highest badge to wear!
Heaven bless your honored, noble
name.
To Masonry and Scotia dear!
A last request permit me here—
When yearly ye assemble a',
One round—I ask it with a tear—
To him, the bard that's far awa.
(*slippery ball)

I also present the following lines
written by the immortal Burns after
visiting the Kilmaronock Masonic
Lodge. The "Willie" of the song
was William Parker, a Kilmaronock
bank agent, whose name figured in
the subscription list of the first edi-
tion of the poet's works for thirty
copies:

Ye sons of Killie, assembled by Wil-
lie,
To follow the noble vocation—
Your thrifty old mother has scarce
such another
To sit in that honored station—
I've little to say, but only to pray,
As praying is the 'ton' of your fash-
ion,
A prayer from the Muse you well
may excuse
'Tis seldom her favorite passion.

Ye powers who preside o'er the
winds and the tide,
Who marked each element's border;
Who formed this frame with ben-
eficent aim,
Whose sovereign statute is order;
Within this dark mansion may way-
ward Contention
Or withered Envy ne'er enter;
May Secrecy round be the mystical
bound,
And Brotherly Love be the centre.

Note—In consideration of the an-
nouncement that the Grand Lodge
of Free and Accepted Masons, Grand
Registry of Canada, will within one
month be in session in our city, the
above immortal lines are presented,
worthy of careful reading and pre-
servation by every Mason. It is
worth mention that the personal
pronoun, "I" is named only three
times in the first address; not once
in the second address; a consid-
eration seldom observed in similar ad-
dresses, Masonic or otherwise.

It may be well to state that the
one who presents the above selec-
tions some twenty years ago saw in
Stirling the Masonic Certificate given
by Kilmaronock Lodge to the fa-
ther of the late Dr. Robert Parker.

TWO ASSESSMENT APPEALS

Before Judge Willis this morning,
two appeals from the Court of Re-
vision were heard and dealt with.
The assessment of two thousand dol-
lars on the Bleeker St. Methodist
church was ordered to be put in the
exempt column.

The Court of Revision had re-
duced the assessment of land and
buildings held by the Canadian Pa-
cific Railway in Murney Ward No.
14 north of the C.P.R. tracks and
north of Dundas street from \$10,-
000 to \$5,000. Judge Willis this mor-
ning put back the assessment to
\$7,800.
