PARIS, Feb. 10.—Few turf secrets have been more sensational and better kept than the inside story of why Bower Ismay's remarkable horse Craganour was disqualified at Epsom last Derby Day, after winning England's world famous race, and of why the American jockey, Johnny Reiff, received no official censure for the fouling and fouling that was alleged to have occurred on the part of the American jockey, Johnny Reiff, and those in high places, it has been told to me here, was the motive for the unprecedented action—retribution sharp and stinging, but without a public turf scandal.

How "Wee Robbie" Jolly, Pro., of Park Ridge Club, Drove Golf Ball For a Record of 1,000 Yards

Robert Jolly, better known as "Wee Dobbie," one of the younger members of the famous St. Andrews Jollys, all of whom are now golf professionals in the United States, has established what he claims is the record drive of a golf ball. The feat which appears to be a record, was a drive of 1,000 yards, and the drive was made under conditions which were as unusual as the drive itself.

Early in the winter, after the weather had driven almost all the golfers off the links of the Park Ridge Country Club, Attorney Charles E. Zolar continued to play over the frozen ground. He experimented, discovered that the cold golf balls could not be driven as far as he ordinarily drove in summer, he warmed them by a stove before starting out and carried them inside his clothing, finding that the warm balls striking on the frozen ground would bound and roll fully fifty yards per drive further than the cold ones would do.

Then, without revealing his secret, he bantered Robbie Jolly into wagering that he could not drive 350 yards. On the frozen ground and with a heated ball the feat proved easy, and the joke was on the professional.

With his Scotch aroused, Jolly remarked that under proper conditions, he could drive 1,000 yards. It seemed impossible, and the wager was made. Zolar forgot, but Jolly did not.

Recently the Des Plaines river froze and presented a perfect sheet of ice, clean and hard. Jolly notified the golfers he was ready for revenge and took them to the river. He teed off a ball warmed to 105 degrees from a point in front of the waterworks of Des Plaines and save for a slight bend
