Golden Wedding of The Ven. Archdeacon and Mrs. Mackenzie

Ven Archdeacon Mackenzie



Many happy returns of the day are being extended to Ven. Archdeacon and Mrs. Mackenzie on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage to-day.

On Sunday last Ven. Archdeacon Mackenzie, rector of Grace Church, celebrated his 35th year of the pulpit of that church. While to-day he and his wife are celebrating the golden anniversary of their wedding, Dr. Mackenzie is one of the most notable figures in the Anglican ministry in this country, and locally is one of Brantford's most beloved and highly esteemed citizens. Regardless of denomination, he is respected by all who know him.

Born in the Province of Quebec, at Danville, Archdeacon Mackenzie is a son of the late Major Alexander Mackenzie, who was 40 years in the British army, and comes from a long line of military forefathers. He attended Trinity University, Toronto, and there graduated and was ordained into the ministry in 1860, 45 years ago. For two years he was in mission work stationed at Haliburton, which was at that time a wild and rough country, settled only by woods men. He then became curate at Trinity Church, Galt, and ministered there for two years, and subsequently at Chatham for six months. Going to Kincardine, Ont., Dr. Mackenzie was rector of the Church of the Messiah there for six years, and then came to Brantford in 1899, where he has so ably filled the rectorship of Grace Church for 35 years. Ten years ago he was made Archdeacon of Perth by the present Bishop Williams of Huron, after having been Rural Dean of Brant for some time. The degree of D.C.L. was conferred on him at the same time by his Alma Mater, Trinity University, Toronto. Fifty years ago to-day, he married a daughter of the late Dean Talbot of London and Galt, and they have six children, five sons and

one daughter. These are Professor Michael Alexander Mackenzie, of Toronto University, Hugh Blair Mackenzie, General Manager of the Bank of British North America for the Dominion, Alexander Webster Mackenzie, head of the Grove School at Lakefield, George Cleghorn Mackenzie, mining engineer in the employ of the Dominion Government, and the youngest son, Norman Scaworth Mackenzie, Manager of the Merchants Bank, B.C. Their only daughter is Frances True, wife of the Rev. Canon Hedley, of Port Arthur, Ont. Of the family, four sons arrived in the city last evening to be guests at the rectory during the celebration of their parents' golden wedding anniversary, these were Professor Mackenzie, Toronto; Mr. Hugh Mackenzie, Montreal; Mr. George Mackenzie, Ottawa; and Dr. Alexander Mackenzie of Lakefield school.

All day yesterday and to-day telegrams of congratulation to Archdeacon and Mrs. Mackenzie came pouring in from all over Canada. To these messages of congratulation the Courier heartily joins in wishing Archdeacon and Mrs. Mackenzie many more years of happiness, and that Dr. Mackenzie may be long spared to the people of Grace Church who love him so well. In the many years of the Archdeacon's splendid service in the ministry there has been a big one. By all she is revered and loved, and the present occasion is one of great happiness to herself, the venerable rector and the splendid family of children and grandchildren assembled together.

A POPULAR DELUSION CONCERNING AN OLD SONG

"Comin' Thro' the Rye"—as now printed and sung, is usually attributed to Robert Burns—but as a matter of fact only the four first four lines are by Burns, the remainder having been added by John Walter, an Edinburgh musical and music seller, who later moved to London.

Burns did write a complete song to an ancient Scottish lay, but the words became coarser and more suggestive with each verse. To-day the Burns' song may be found only in the Johnson "Museum" of minor verse.

The air to which "Comin' Thro' the Rye" has become familiar to thousands of Canadians—and to which it is now sung—is an old melody. "The Miller's Daughter"—somewhat modified by Walter.

People generally, and the artist and commentator who have followed suit, have taken it for granted that the song referred to crossing a field of rye. But the authentic version, however, shows that it refers to the fording of the River Rye, where certain stepping stones allowed the barefooted Highland lassies to cross none the wiser for the shallow water that swirled about their pretty ankles.

It may well be imagined that Burns and his convivial cronies were not averse to "happening along" when certain of the local beauties came "Thro' the Rye" on their way to kirk or fair.

This world-famous melody is to be found in the wonderful collection entitled "Heart Songs"—now offered by the Courier paper to its readers on terms that make it practically a gift. HIGH COURT

Only Two Cases Before Justice Britton This Morning at Court House

The High Court was held in the county court this morning before the Honourable Justice Britton of Toronto. There were two cases to be heard and they were Watt v. Lake, plaintiffs represented by Harley and Sweet and defendants by Brewster and Hey, and Wallace v. Mackay, plaintiffs represented by Brewster and Hey, and defendants by Johnson McKay, Doherty and Grant.

The second case is one of breach of contract and non-payment of salary. The defence contends that the Mackay Company are not liable as the defendant which plaintiff has been ratified by them.
