Shutting Senators Out, Sox Take Second Game

Mr. Henry Gero, Backed Up by Splendid Support,
Humbled "Shag's" Pennant Chasers
6-0.

A complete shut-out, 6-0, was the way the Red Sox dealt with the Ottawa Senators in the second of the three game series at Agricultural Park yesterday afternoon. After the closely contested battle of Thursday, when the locals won out by the close score of 4-3, there was a good many doubts expressed as to whether the Red Sox could win out again, but they did it in exactly the same way that they won the Thursday game—by good ball playing.

Gero pitched for the Sox, and he pitched a great game, striking out no less than eight of the Senators and allowing only six hits. Verily the Red Sox seem to have been resurrected from the slough of despair in which they have been wading for the past two weeks.

The Senators put up a rotten exhibition of baseball, and a worse one of good sportsmanship and decent conduct. Johnny Lush, umpire, may be no job, but it is a cinch he stood for the lip, beefing and profanity of the Senators longer than anyone in the grandstand. Johnny even refused to hear Shag's polite message to him from centre field, which was heard distinctly in the stands, to be "What the h—, get a new umpire in there."

Johnny stood it until the ninth when he ordered Smykal off the field, for a disgusting exhibition of chin.

Peterson started the twirling for Ottawa, but he only lasted three innings, during which spasm the Red Sox got to him for three hits and as many runs. He was ordered out of the game by Lush for wrangling with Shag, and the umpire. "Get a new pitcher in there," yelled Lush, who was evidently disgusted with the back lot stuff handed out by the Senators. Kubat was substituted, and he was not much better, the Sox gathering three hits and three runs off him. In

no innings was there much chance of the Senators scoring; the eighth being the only one in which they secured more than one hit and these were only two being singles by Kubat and Smykal. The Red Sox, on the other hand, had the punch with them right from the start, getting three safe bingles in the very first innings by Nelson, Deneau and Ivers and both Johnny and Rube scored. Long scored in the third, after being walked, and scoring by Nelson's sacrifice and Ivers' single. Thrailkill scored in the fourth after reaching first on Shag's error, and second on Lamond's bunt, third on Smykal's error, and home on a squeeze play by LaCroix. Brantford's lost two runs were secured in the fifth when Nelson scored on Rube's double, the only double by the way of the whole game, and then Rube reached home on Iver's single over left.

Roth hit to second, a double play resulting. Meanwhile Nelson scored. Thrailkill flied to right. Two runs, three hits, no errors.

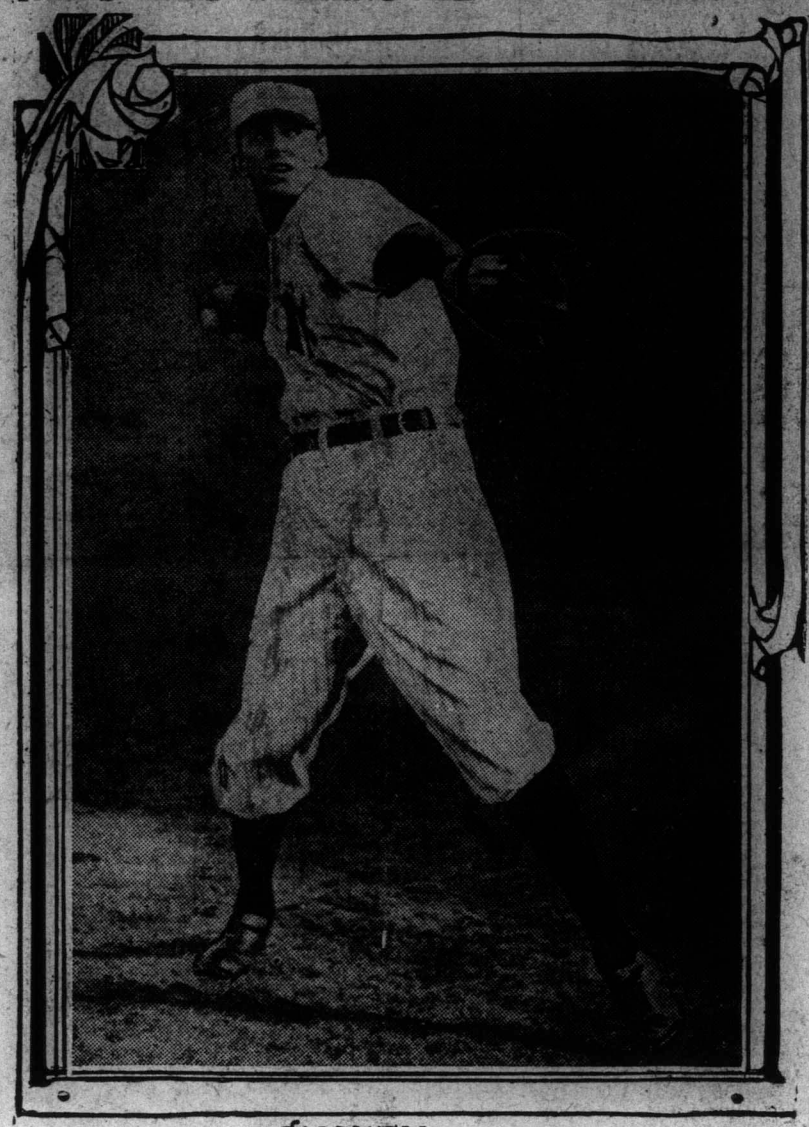

Perhaps it is due to the fact that the Senators have a lot of games at home where they can crab the umpires.

"To h— with that stuff, get in an umpire." Never has lady fandom been so grossly, openly and flagrantly insulted as at yesterday's game. The above profanity was yelled by Shaughnessy from centre field. There was no one in the park except the umpire, who failed to hear it. The result was, that Deneau told the Ottawa manager he would slap him in the face if he opened fire again. One thing about Deneau, there is nobody chasing him around, not even an Ottawa bulldozer.

Nicholls, the big right hander, was purposely saved yesterday, to pitch the game to-day. Deneau figures that Nicholls is a winner, and he accordingly wants one for the Saturday crowd.

St. Thomas jolted London yesterday, and should have done it on Thursday. In fact Brantford should have done it twice this week. At any rate Erie is in second place and the Sox look good enough to climb.

Although one mustn't say it above a whisper, we are creditably informed that by Monday Brantford will have a ball team. This talk of getting new players on a minute's notice isn't any joke. Shaughnessy announced earlier in the week that he had four new ones, yet we haven't seen any of them reporting here.

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
