SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions).

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. THEIR ARMY MADE INTO BEATEN MOB

Russians Have Inflicted Severe Defeat on Germans.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—The Petrograd correspondent of The Post, in telegraphing a review of the situation on the Russian front, says: "Only time is now required to reduce the Germanic forces in their entirety from a fighting army to a beaten mob. The Russian cavalry is pressing hard upon their retreat which is over abominable sloughs of roads, fringed by bog land and marshy forests. Prisoners and other trophies of success are being taken all the time, but no attempt has yet been made to estimate their numbers. "Wounded men, in their accounts of the fighting around the village of Kozenica, state that while the artillery duel was proceeding for several days and nights, the troops were unable to move. Finally the artillery fire became equal on both sides and orders came to make a bayonet attack. The soldiers, stiff and miserable from their long confinement, in the flooded trenches, were only too delighted at the order and dashed upon the German line with irresistible vigor. The Germans, for the second time during the war on this side, met them with the bayonet and a terrible fight ensued. Neither side could gain the advantage and the slaughter was fearful. "Finally a Russian hurrah came down on the wind from the flank, followed by brisk firing. The Germans mistook this for a successful out-flanking movement and they broke and fled, abandoning everything in their run for safety. The Russians pursued them for twenty miles and the plain was strewn with the German dead. COMPLETELY WRECKED LONDON, Oct. 23.—A. M.—"The German advance in Poland has been transformed into a hasty and in some parts a disorderly retreat," says the Petrograd correspondent of The Daily Mail. "This retreat was primarily caused by a Russian cavalry force from Novogeorgievsk, which crossed the Vistula and turned the enemy's left flank. "The retreat of the Germans left wing will force their army operating around Kozenica and

Ivangorod to retreat also, as well as the army in the vicinity of Sandomir and to the southward. Thus the ambitious plan to capture Warsaw and possess both banks of the Vistula during the winter campaign has been completely wrecked.

News received from the Russian front in Poland says a statement issued by the official bureau, relates that the Russians have captured the ground equery of the King of Saxony. He was riding in the royal automobile when taken.

A young general, who had only just recovered from grave wounds led the Russians in a successful assault in the Heights of Radowo on the San River, north of Przemysl, the news bureau also announces. The Austrians fled in disorder and the Russians succeeded in capturing twenty two thousand prisoners and a thousand men. The enemy left 200 wounded on the field.

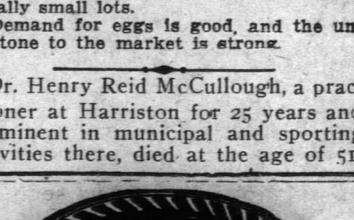
MONTREAL GRAIN MARKET. MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—There was a fall demand from foreign buyers for Manitoba spring wheat today, and as bids were in line with exporters' views sales of 150,000 bushels were made, but the volume of business was checked owing to the increased scarcity of ocean freight room.

There was also some demand from exporters for wheat on spot, and sales of 20,000 bushels of No. 1 northern wheat were made at \$1.19, and 45,000 bushels of No. 3 at \$1.14 per bushel, c.i.f. The demand from local dealers for oats was good, and sales of 140,000 bushels of No. 2 feed were made at 54c, and 30,000 bushels at 54 1/2c, while 65,000 bushels No. 1 feed sold at 55 1/2c per bushel, c.i.f.

Flour continues quiet, but the tone of the market is firm. The trade in mill-feed is quiet. Hay is more active and stronger at an advance of 50c per ton. Demand for butter is quiet, and prices rule steady.

There was some business done in cheese over the cable, but the sales were principally small lots. Demand for eggs is good, and the undertone to the market is strong.
