CHATHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The council of the Township Chatham met at the Robinson Hall in the town of Wallaceburg on Tues-day, the 17th day of June, 1902, to consider the engineer's report on the Brown drain in Running Creek, and the transacting of general business pursuant to adjournment and the notice in that behalf.

The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved of and signed by

A large number of the ratepayers on the Running Creek were present and the engineer's report on the construction of a drain in said creek was read, also a letter from the manager of the Chatham Dredging Co. the work for offering to do all A great deal of discussion was indulged in regarding the matter. It was finally decided that the work be abandoned and a written request signed by a large majority of the petitioners to that effect was presented to the council; also that their names be written down from the

General business was then proceeded with. A petition was read from ratepaythe vicinity of Brown's church stating the road being the boundary between lot No. A and 1 in the north gore is in a bad condition, and asking that the travelled portion of the said road be improved and widen-ed; also that the bridge over Running Creek, near the said point be put in a safe condition. An agree-ment was made with Mr. James Daurin to move his house in order to widen the said road. The same was written and signed by Mr. Dauirn and the reeve, and accepted by the

Councillor Wm. George submitted a report to the effect that he met and consulted with the ratepayers of school section No. 17 with the view of opening a road between lots and 19 from the River north; Mr. Booth offers to give the land for a road two rods wide from the River to the 3rd concession in lieu of the present school site; Mr. Wooliver, the owner of lot 18 and 19 in the 3rd concession asks \$75 per acre from the 3rd to the 4th concession; there will have to be a bridge built over the Dredge ditch in Otter Creek, which will cost about \$100.
