Calvin Austin, president of the Eastern Steamship Co., stated recently that the taking over of the D. A. R. steamers will follow the new election of a board of directors with Calvin Austin as president. The old management will be continued until the end of the year. Two new steamers are to be built for this line, to go into commission in 1912. The new service to Yarmouth will be inaugurated next spring with the steamship Old Colony. No change will be made in the D. A. R. steamers this year, but different sailings will go into effect in the spring. The new steamers will be of Scotch design, built in America, and similar to the Harvard and Yale steamships which formerly plied between Boston and New York. Mr. Austin says he wants boats with plenty of state room accommodation.

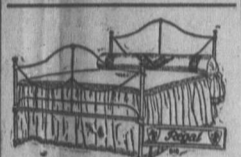
