AT THE COUNCIL

The House met at 4 p.m.
The Bill respecting the Sealfishery during the present year was deferred. The Bill to amend Chapter 75 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled of sufferers from Marine Disasters passed the Committee stage without amendment.

The Bill to Regulate the Importation, Exportation Manufacture, sale and use of Opium and other dangerous drugs passed the committee stage with some amendments as did the bill to amend Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'of the Customs.'

The second reading of the supplementary Bill was deferred. 'An Act for the Disposal of Surplus Funds collected for Hospital Cots' passed second reading.
This is a bill to legalize the disposal of the Surplus funds of the Cot Fund that was collected by the St. John's Ambulance Association during the war. In all about \$12000 remains and it is proposed to allot this amount as follows:—

Patriotic Association . . . 2000.00
Marine Disaster Fund . . . 2000.00
Outport War Memorials . . . 3000.00
Grand Falls Ladies' Ass'n . . . 300.00

The balance will be retained by the Association to be used as they may deem fit with the consent of the Executive Government.

In The Balacava Charge

Trumpeter James Richardson, last survivor but one of the Balacava charge, has died of influenza at Liverpool, aged 91. He was behind behind Lord Cardigan at Balacava, but was not wounded while charging. On returning he was hit and the wound healed, but two years ago he suffered pains in the shoulder. He was operated upon and seven canister shots were taken out which had been in the flesh for 64 years.

At Newcastle Assizes, David Nichol, claimant, a Burgess of Morpeth, claimed £800 from Samuel Thomas Robinson, an Inspector of the N.S.P.C.A., and £500 from Richard Lamberton Peabry, a North Eastern Railway clerk, as penalties for having sat and voted in Morpeth Town Council, having omitted to make a return of election expenses required by the Act of 1884. The Judge remitted the case for argument in London, saying the points involved were very important.

Shipping Man Dead

The death has occurred at his residence in Monkstown, Co. Dublin, of Sir James Joseph Murphy, chief partner in the firm of Messrs. Palgrave, Murphy and Co., steamship owners. The son of the late Mr. Michael Murphy, of Dublin, he was 75. Up to a short time ago, when his health began to fail, he was one of the most prominent figures in the commercial life of the city. He was knighted in 1902, while president of the Chamber of Commerce, and was made a baronet in the following year. He leaves no heir.

LOCAL ITEMS

Not Reported.—Nothing further has been reported from the S. S. Glencoe, since leaving Grand Bank 6.35 Thursday evening.

Leaves Halifax.—The S. S. Canadian leaves Halifax on the 20th inst. for this port with general cargo.

Has Monday.—The Sable I. leaves Lunenburg to-day and is due here Monday morning.

Passed Cambrian.—The S. S. Digby passed the H.M.S. Cambrian off Cape Race. The warship should make port this morning.

Digby Sails.—The Digby was supposed to have sailed for Liverpool about two o'clock to-day.

Is Nominated.—Ernest Gear has been nominated for membership in the Newfoundland Board of Trade.

Three Thousand Ruined Churches

Three thousand churches in the devastated regions of France—including the Cathedrals of Reims, Arras, Soissons, and St. Quentin—need to be restored, and a six per cent loan of 200,000,000 francs (£4,000,000) is shortly to be issued for this purpose by an approved group of cooperative societies.

Drowned In a Tub

At an inquest at amstead on the body of George Miller, aged, of the Bird in Hand public house, West End lane, of which he had been licensee for 50 years. It was stated that he drowned himself by putting his head face downwards in a tub containing 8 1/2 in. depth of water. A verdict of 'Suicide while of unsound mind' was recorded.

The output of coal for the week ended February 18 was 5,000,800 tons, compared with 4,912,500 tons in the previous week and 4,284,103 tons in the corresponding week output of 1921. During the past year the weekly output has hitherto exceeded the five million mark only once—on December 17, when the total was 5,030,700 tons.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

The House met at 3.15 and sat through the afternoon and night.

Mr. W. J. Walsh, Mr. P. F. Moore and Mr. N. J. Vinicombe spoke in the afternoon, and Mr. M. P. Cashin at night. Mr. W. B. Jennings also spoke before the Committee on the Loan Resolutions rose to report progress and dealt with charges made against his department by Opposition members. The Minister of Public Works in an able and fearless manner handled the unfounded charges of the government's opponents. He dealt with the work on the Badger and Deer Lake roads and pointed out that in the report of the Auditor General was to be found the best vindication of himself and his department in connection with the whole fabrication of lies told by the Opposition.

The Committee rose at 12.30 a.m., reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

With regard to the resolutions of the Newfoundland Industrial Workers' Association, forwarded the Council at its last regular meeting, it would appear from the report of the proceedings that the petition was mainly on behalf of the Association.

This is not the case, as the N.I.W.A. stands for labour of all kinds in the city. As non-residents are being given the preference over city workmen, who are taxpayers, it was the opinion of the Association that contractors and other employers of labour should give consideration to citizens first. If this was done, much of the present destitution, through unemployment, could be relieved; and it was with this object in view that the resolutions were submitted to the Council.
