A NOTED RAILWAY COUNSEL.

L. A. Lash, R.C., Chief Legal Light

For the C. N. R. Mr. Zebulon Alton Lash, K.C., whose name was mentioned so frequently in connection with those of Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann in the recent Parliamentary debates on the Canadian Northern Railway agreement, is one of the leading lawyers of Toronto and has a national repulation both as a pleader and as counsel. He is credered with having drafted the agreement be tween Mackenzie and Mann and the Dominion Government and he certainly has exercised great influence over the policy of the big railway firm. Not only has he been for years chief counsel for the Canadian Northern Railway, but he is vice-president of the Quebec and Lake St. John Rail-way, vice-president of the Canadian Northern Railway, and one of the promoters and a director of Mackensie Mann & Co. Ltd., as well as being connected with many other concern It will be seen that Mr. Lash's in terests are practically identical with those of the two railway kni gave \$10,000 towards the building of the Toronto General Hospital and \$5.000 to the Toronto Y. M. C. A. Mr. Lash was born in Newfound-

land and educated there. Having been called to the Bar of Ontario he practiced for eight years in Toronto, and was for some years lecturer and examiner in commercial and criminal law to the Law Society of Ontario. Later he was appointed Deputy Minister of Justice at Ottawa and was counsel for the Dominion Govern-ment before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in the Mercer escheat case. He resigned his appointment under the Government to resume practice at the Bar at the invitation of the Messrs: Blake, who admitted him a member of their firm. Mr. Lash has the reputation of being one of the most finished elo-cutionists of the Canadian Bar, the modulations of his voice being always pleasing and his delivery and general style most effective. This is perhaps not to be wondered at, for during the whole of his active life he has made a hobby of reciting. When a young-er man he often delighted his friends with selections from Shakespeare, Dickeus, and Sir Walter Scott. Of later years he prefers more modern authors. Many a fashionable social gathering in Toronto has been made to stand out in the memory of those attending by reason of Mr. Lash's contribution towards the amusement of the evening.

Mr. Lash is chairman of the Canadian National League and author of 'A Treatise on Vice-Admiralty in connection with the jurisdiction of the Maritime Court of Ontario" and of various articles contributed to the reviews. Mrs. Lash was the daughter of the late Judge Miller, of Milton,

Farm Labor In Ontario. Applicants for work on Ontario farms have been more plentiful this year than for many years, but much of the labor offering has been unskilled in agriculture, a considerable number of men from towns and cities having this season sought rural employment. The light hay crop, the short, upright straw of the grain crops, and the favorable weather for harvesting have required much less field help at harvesting. Farmers are also utilizing improved machinery more and more in order to save manual labor, and many of them have also developed a system of exchange of work with neighbors which is making them largely independent of casual help. Wages show little change, ranging from \$1.25 to \$2, or even \$2.50 (with board) during herwest, according to skill or locality, and from \$20 to \$35 per month, with extra good hands commanding as high as \$40.
