How to Prepare Several Nice Winter time Dainties. The most delicious cakes can be made with nuts, and now we have a fresh supply of wahnuts and filberts the fancey for them can be indelged. Wahnut cake is good either with chop-ped nuts mixed in the cake when it is made or with a layer of wahnut cream between two slices of cake. For the first, cream four onnces of butter, add six ounces of slited sugar and cream again; then put in the beaten yolks of three eggs and, when well mixed, sift in seven onnces of flour and a good tenspoonfal of baking powder. If more moisture is necessary use milk or cream, but the whites of the eggs, beaten to a stiff froth, will, of course, moisten the mixture. To this quantity of ligredients half a pound of peeled wahnuts, which have been roughly chopped, will be required, and they should be mixed in last of all. Bake the mixture in a buttered tin for about an 'hour, and ice. If wighed, with


