Baseball Charges. To the Sporting Editor of the Times: Sir,—Being a lover of baseball and a regular attendant, and hoping to see a good attendance at the games at Britannia Park this season, so that the management may be encouraged to put a team in the Eastern League next year, I am sorry to say that the management is, in my opinion, adopting the wrong course to encourage the patrons.

For instance, the game with Toronto at an admission fee of 50c and 25c extra for grand stand, when a game with another league team in Toronto, at fair prices, including the ferry trips and grand stand admission, appears to me to be unfair. Also on the holiday the grand stand admission was advertised at 15c, and when the public arrived they were charged 25c. Now, if the management expect the public support, they must act fair, as all sports do. A number of supporters are not going to attend, not entirely on account of the charges, but on principle. I hope the management will give this matter their serious consideration and try and encourage the public by giving them good ball at fair prices, properly advertised, rather than to discourage them by soaking them, especially for exhibition games. Hamiltonians are good sports, and will be loyal if the sport is good, but are not going to be stung.

A TORY GROWL

Which is Taken as a Sign of Their Weakening.

(Special Despatch to the Times.) Ottawa, May 29.—Since the election bill was introduced the Opposition has been steadily defiant until yesterday, when it sent out a semi-official complaint to the press. This is the first sign of weakening by either of the parties, and it is taken at Ottawa as an indication that the Opposition has begun to feel alarm over the way the country may regard the new principle of majority rule which Sir Wilfrid and his followers have declared. The complaint in the Conservative press is that the Opposition has not been fairly treated by Sir Wilfrid, who failed to give it a definite statement of the changes which he was willing to have made in the Manitoba clause of the election bill.

This is regarded as a bid for sympathy from the country. The Conservative statement is neither frank nor accurate. The Opposition has had Sir Wilfrid's offer of judges to revise the Manitoba lists for weeks. That offer was made public in the House of Commons on May 11, and as the Conservative press itself announced, was supplemented by a definite statement in writing from Sir Wilfrid and that statement as previously announced contained an offer to amend the clause by providing for a revision of the Manitoba lists by the Manitoba court judges.

It was announced in the Conservative press that this offer had been considered in caucus by all the Conservative members of the Commons and had been rejected by them. The best evidence of the desire of the Conservatives to do the fair thing is shown by the fact that Sir Wilfrid has gone to the Opposition leader not once, but several times, to try and arrange a compromise, while there has been absolutely no overture from Mr. Borden.

It is generally known that Mr. Borden refused to discuss an amendment or compromise or to discuss the bill unless the Government withdrew clauses one and seventeen, the revision and the spoiled ballot clauses. In view of this attitude, the Government could hardly be expected to furnish a draft of the proposed amendment. It is not customary to frame the language of a law until the general principles have been decided.

The memorandum of changes to put judges in control of the Manitoba lists, both for their preparation and revision, was quite definite enough to be accepted by any one who wanted fair voters' lists for the Dominion elections in Manitoba. The conservative statement is inaccurate, and hardly honest, but it is welcome as an evidence of the return of some sanity to the Opposition.

PASSENGERS HURT.

Connellsville, Pa., May 29.—The observation parlor car on the Royal Blue Limited, on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, bound for New York, plunged over an embankment near here at noon today. The car was crowded, and all the passengers were injured.




