If there be one part of the service more extensively beneficial to the navy and the country, may the world at large, than another, it is this particular portion of it in which Capt. Oriehar is now engaged, and we have long since made it a subject of silent admiration to observe, how quietly and unostentatiously the invaluable labours of Capt. Bayfield and his brother officers are given to the world unheralded by any flourish of trumpets: not unappreciated however, for by all scientific men, and those of every country, the results of the patient and accurate investigations of the officers of the Gulars will be held in greater esteem and more highly prized the better they are known. Bayfield's charts will be in greater demand half a century hence than they are at present. That the exertions of scientific men should be looked upon with contempt by men whose minds are of limited calibre, we can well understand. It is with the vulgar and uninformed only, that Mr. Coles's observations can have the least weight. We look upon the selection of the harbour of Charlottetown for the wintering station of the surveying establishment under the command of Capt. Bayfield, as one of the most fortunate occurrences that could have happened. The gentlemen composing it have effected a large amount of good to Charlottetown and its vicinity, in the same quiet and unostentatious way, that their professional duties have been performed. But we stop here, fearful of offending those whose friendship we hold it an honor to possess, and which we would not willingly risk losing by any unauthorized expressions of praise, however highly merited.

The *Ship James Cheston*.—In the London Shipping Gazette of March 28th, we find a letter of Capt. Wilson, of the British Bark *Marathon*, by which the ship *James Cheston* was picked up, after being abandoned, in which he gives the following account of the condition in which that ship was found:

"All the hatches were off and everything in disorder on deck, ship's papers, compasses, and wearing apparel being taken away. I immediately went into the hold, and found about three feet water on the between decks, and also perceived water rushing in around and through two holes in the cargo port. To all appearances attempts had been made to force out the port, but the lashings being cut, and the port nearly cut through; there were also two other holes through it, and the water was running in with great force."
