STABLES' GROCERY NOW COMPLETE

The new store recently erected on the old site on the public square for Mr. James Stables has been completed. Mr. B. A. Tozer, the contractor is to be congratulated on his work and the erection of this new building along with Mr. W. L. Durick's new drug store is a great improvement to the business section of the town, and shows the faith these two men have in the Town of Newcastle as well as their progressiveness.

Mr. Stables has moved into his new store and is now doing business there. At present his employees are busily engaged putting things to rights and in a very short time, these preliminaries will all be completed. It is Mr. Stables' intention to hold a gigantic opening day on Thursday of this week and he respectfully invites the general public to his store on that day.

Mr. George Stables was the founder of the Stables' Grocery in 1880, and first conducted the business in the building now occupied by Mr. B.F. Maltby. He then moved to the building now occupied by C. M. Dickison & Sons, and later to the building presently occupied by Mrs. S. A. Demers. In 1887, Mr. Stables purchased the store and site on the public square, from where the business has since been conducted.

Year after year the business kept expanding and has been recognized by not only the people of Newcastle and surrounding districts, but also throughout the province as one of the most outstanding grocery stores. About five years ago, his son James the present proprietor took over the business and has made a great success of it. So much a success has been made that Mr. Stables soon realized that his store was too small and undapted for his ever increasing business and immediately took steps to provide more suitable quarters. Early this spring he removed his stock to the Bannock Store where through the summer months he conducted his grocery, and a contract was let for the building of his new store.

The building is faced with brick and considerably larger than the old store. The lower floor is to be used for the main grocery store, and a full sized concrete basement will be utilized for the storage of heavy stock. Crockeryware will be kept on the second floor, which is approached by a beautiful stairway leading from the front store. On one side and connected with the main store will be the Meat Market which will be under the capable management of an experienced man. Several beautiful rooms upstairs will be available for offices, etc. The fixtures are such as can be found only in the most up-to-date sanitary grocery stores of the large

TO AID OWN PEOPLE BEFORE EMIGRANTS

Labor Situation is Changing for Better.

Monetary encouragement for New Brunswick people to assist in a well defined plan for colonization in the province rather than loaning such encouragement to Europeans to come here and settle is the policy to be put forward by the Provincial Government at the inter-provincial conference on colonization and immigration at Ottawa next Wednesday and Thursday, according to Hon. J.E. Michaud, of Edmundston, Minister without portfolio.

Hon. Mr. Michaud who has given much time and study to the needs of this province in regard to these two important matters, will represent New Brunswick at the Ottawa conference, along with Hon. D.W. Mersereau, of Fredericton Junction Minister of Agriculture. The framing of the New Brunswick Government's policy has been left largely in the hands of Hon. Mr. Michaud and at a meeting in Fredericton, this policy was endorsed by the cabinet.

In an interview Hon. Mr. Michaud said: "Outside of Great Britain and Ireland and the Scandinavian countries, we do not feel that we should encourage emigration from Europe. People from the countries named can adapt themselves to our mode of living and our ideals. What is essential to their coming out here however is that they be possessed of sufficient capital to carry on. In brief we do not believe in an open door policy, so far as New Brunswick is concerned."

Delorme Trial Goes Over until March

By order of acting Chief Justice Martin, presiding in the court of King's Bench, the Delorme trial was postponed until the next sitting of this court, due March 1924.

Postponement in murder trial, on motion made on Monday by A. Taschereau, K.C., counsel for Delorme, came after the bench had read affidavits submitted by Mr. Taschereau and the priest himself presenting "cogent reasons" for delay and has ruled that the affidavits should not be made public.

A referendum on the question of government control of liquor in Ontario will likely be taken in June of next year. Frank W. Wilson, member in the legislature for Windsor, favors an early vote. The success of the vote in Alberta may hasten government action the local Conservatives asserted.

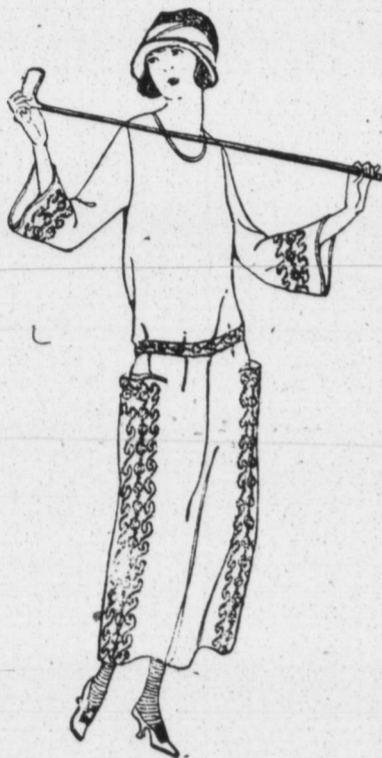
