

EDMONTON'S FOURTH PUBLIC SCHOOL

The Corner Stone of the New Norwood School, to be Erected at an Estimated Cost of \$60,000, Laid Thursday by Most Worshipful Grand Master Hobbin, of Calgary, Under Impressive Masonic Ceremonies—Premier, Rutherford, Present and Delivers Address—New School To Be One of the Finest in the Province.

With the appropriate words, "Well made, well laid, well proved, true and trusty," the corner stone of the handsome new Norwood school at the junction of Kimbrius avenue and Norwood boulevard was laid yesterday afternoon by Rev. Mr. Hobbin, the newly elected most worshipful grand master of the Masons of Alberta, who presided at the ceremony, and the members of the Grand Lodge, who marched on in procession, headed by the strathcona fire brigade team, and presented a very imposing appearance on the beautiful spring afternoon.

The ceremony was watched by a large number of people, including the members of the public school board, their wives and many other ladies. It was almost half past four when the procession reached the school, a long wait having been caused by an unexpected delay in the Grand Lodge work during the afternoon.

The Ceremony. When the brethren had gathered around the corner the ceremony of laying the stone was begun after the most worshipful grand master had expressed his pleasure at being present.

The grand chaplain, Rev. W. R. George, invoked the blessing on the undertaking. Then the most worshipful grand registrar read the inscription on the scroll and deposited it in the receptacle under the stone. Next the most worshipful grand treasurer placed underneath the stone containing the coins of the Dominion of Canada, after which the corner stone itself, of Kootenay marble, was set in place.

Then it was tested and found to be high in accordance with the rules of Masonry, after which the emblematic corn was scattered and the wine and oil spilled upon its top. The closing words of approval were pronounced by the most worshipful grand master. This was followed by two short addresses.

The Addresses. The most worshipful grand master spoke briefly. It was a great pleasure for him, he said, to be present and lay the corner stone of the fourth public school of Edmonton. It was a city of pleasure to him in several ways: first, because for 24 years he had been engaged in the education of the youth of this province.

Then the brethren were asked to undertake to erect such a handsome school as the present one. It was a great pleasure for him to see that this would be the annual report for years to come. This gave a splendid evidence of the growth of the city. Great interest was being shown all over the province in the education of the youth.

The school will be the best equipped, largest and most modern of any of the schools which Edmonton now possesses. It will be built of pressed brick with full front of Roman stone and concrete block material which is being imported from Ontario. The building will be three stories high with full basement. The class rooms will all be on the top two floors, and will be ten in number. On the top floor will be the auditorium capable of seating 600 people. In the basement will be the lavatories and the girls' and boys' recreation rooms. The working flats will be exceptionally complete with respect to waiting rooms for teachers, library and reading rooms for the pupils.

The aim of the school board is to afford the best advantages for teaching by means of modern equipment, general lay out of class rooms and facilities for the recreation as well as the study of the pupils. The school will cost upwards of \$60,000.

The architect is Roland W. Lines, and the contractors, Pheneasy & Eaton, who now have a large number of men employed on the building. The silver trowel of unique design, used in the ceremony, was the work of A. Bruce Bowley, who did both the designing and the engraving. After the work had been performed it was presented by Mr. Lines to the most worshipful grand master, Rev. Mr. Hobbin.

Phillips Arrested for Vagrancy. Macleod, Alta., May 28—Mike Phillips, the man acquitted of the murder of Monte Lewis a few days ago, was arrested at Frank for vagrancy and was brought in Macleod Sunday night to serve ten days in the barracks.

Under the direction of this board the Alexander Taylor School is erected and the Norwood school projected, and construction work commenced. The personnel of the 1906 Board of Education is the same, as that of 1907 with the exception of Judge H. C. Taylor, who has been succeeded by Alex. Butcher, and St. Geo. Jellett, Secretary-Treasurer, who recently resigned after many years service, and who has been succeeded by W. D. Brady.
