

Accident at Wabana

A young man named Noseworthy, who is suffering from a chill in the legs, arrived from Bell Island to-day for the Hospital. A man named Hickey, who had a leg broken by a blast, also came here and was sent to Hospital. Another man named Costello, of Conception Harbor, who fell yesterday and broke his left arm at the wrist, also arrived here to-day and goes home for treatment.

Miner Killed In Acadia Slope.

Westville, Jan. 24.—James Baxter and George Beveridge, miners, were working to-day in the under coal a short distance from the slope on No. 516 landing, timbering the roof in the Acadia Mine. Beveridge had left Baxter for a few minutes to push a full box to the slope when he was startled by a crash and turning found the roof had fallen burying Baxter under tons of stone and coal. Beveridge himself was knocked down and slightly injured, and his lamp extinguished. He called loudly for light and help which were immediately forthcoming.

A rescue crew was soon formed which worked hard for four hours, to release their entombed comrade. When they had him nearly uncovered another heavy fall occurred with danger to the heroic workers. None fortunately were hurt. When at last they had cleared the debris away they found their comrade dead from suffocation. Mr. Baxter was a native of Westville, and respected by all. He leaves a widow and nine small children to mourn his untimely death.

Wearing Orange Blossoms.

The custom of wearing orange blossoms at weddings is of comparatively recent date. It came to us, like most other fashions in dress, from the French, who, in their turn, derived it from Spain. In the latter country it had long obtained, and is said to have been originally of Moorish origin.

There is, however, an old Spanish legend which gives a different account of its introduction. According to this, soon after the importation of the orange tree by the Moors, one of the Spanish kings had a specimen of which he was very proud, and of which the French Ambassador was extremely desirous to obtain an offshoot.

The gardener's daughter was aware of this, and in order to provide herself with the necessary dowry to enable her to marry her lover, she obtained a slip, which she sold to the Ambassador at a high price. On the occasion of her wedding, in recognition of her gratitude to the man who had procured her happiness, she bound in her hair a wreath of orange blossoms, and thus inaugurated the fashion which has become universal.

What it Sounds like to be Bombarded.

Belgrade, Dec. 26.—Dragomir Marinkovitch, advocate and reserve lieutenant in the Serbian infantry, describes as follows his experiences outside Adrianople:

"We would have been all right in the trenches if it had not rained. The weather was fine and dry at first. We had each four or five pairs of socks or stockings, besides wisps of hay stuffed into our roomy army top-boots. We had nothing warm to eat for twenty-five days, and I think that is what we felt the most."

"We had the satisfaction of firing as much as we wanted and whenever we wanted, but it was only useless expenditure of ammunition, and I fear we kept at it only through 'nerves.'"

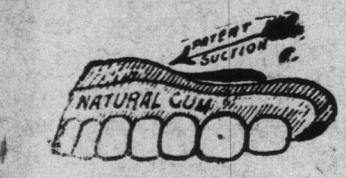
Poison Mystery.

Exhuming of Body of Young Aristocrat May Develop Tragedy.

London, Jan. 16.—A poison mystery which may possibly develop into a full blown tragedy is the sensation of the hour in London. In September of last year Hugh Eric Trevanion, aged 27, a grandson of Sir Daniel Cooper, a cousin of the Earl of Strathmore and also related to the Right Hon. Walter Long, and Lord Northland died, presumably from an overdose of veronal. Curiously enough, at the inquest, at which a verdict was returned of death through misadventure, the question of holding a post mortem examination was decided in the negative, but Mr. Trevanion's mother was dissatisfied with the decision and got permission from the Home Secretary, Mr. McKenna, to have the body exhumed for the purpose of discovering the cause of death.

It appears that shortly before coming of age Trevanion suffered severely from insomnia, after which he became addicted to the use of drugs. At the time of his death he was sharing a luxurious flat at Hove, Brighton, with a friend of the name of Roe. On the night of his death Trevanion retired early. Later on he told his friend, Roe, who had gone to his room, that he had taken an overdose of veronal. The question to be decided is whether the veronal or some poison was self administered, or otherwise. The dead man was worth some \$400,000.

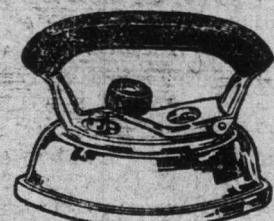
