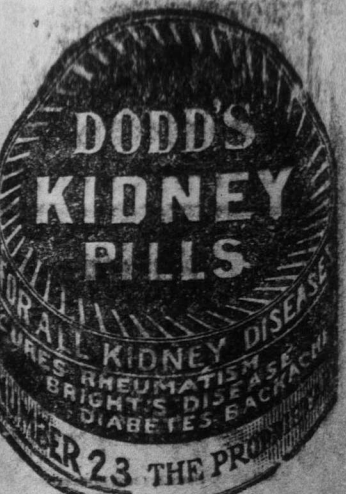

PLAIN FACTS From a Well-wisher of Clean Government.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—In my article to your
paper a few nights ago, I promised
that I would deal further with some
of the outstanding blunders contain-
ed in the manifesto issued in connec-
tion with the so-called People's Par-
ty. Most of your readers are aware
of the relations of some of that party
with the Railway Contractors, and
what an advantage it means to the
Reids to have that party once more
in power. It has been whispered
time after time that they are pre-
pared to finance the party to a large
extent on the possibility of Morris
and his worthies getting the reins of

unprofitable and monstrous bargain
it means. \$400,000 was the total ex-

This colossal sum has been paid over
in GOLD, in practically the twinkling
of an eye, and what the total expendi-
ture will ultimately amount to good-
ness only knows. This item alone
only constitutes one of many of the
platforms as outlined by Morris, to
say nothing of the enormous grants
involved in all his other worthless
undertakings. I think I can safely
state without fear of contradiction,
that should he be returned to office,
the public debt will have reached
such immense proportions that it
will be impossible for us as a self-
governing colony to find the where-

lic life some of our very best citi-
zens, of all creeds and classes, for
fear that his dirty pen would be the
means of causing endless annoy-
ance, both in a business and social
way. The intelligence of our peo-
ple, however, cannot be treated in
such a barefaced and despicable
manner for ever, and they are begin-
ning to realize what sort of creature
has been doing so much harm to
both church and state in our midst.
So much for P. T. Are the Bonavies

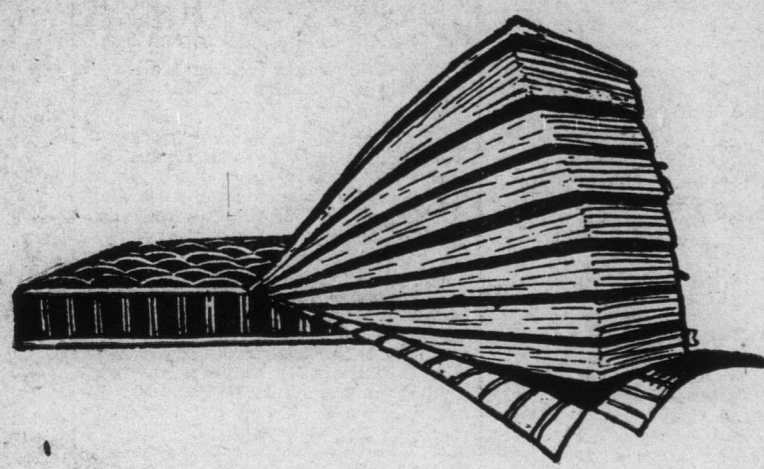
