Regulating the Bookies
Ottawa, April 15.—As a result of the conference which took place tonight between the promoter and supporters of the Miller anti-race track gambling bill and some of the racing associations representatives, a compromise was agreed upon and it is more than likely that the bill as proposed to be amended will go through this session. The chief terms of the amendment are that race meetings of seven days duration each will be allowed twice each year and bookmakers will be allowed to attend during the term of meeting. The negative provisions of the bill will be that no new race tracks will be permitted to be organized, the operations of hand bookmen and tipsters are prohibited, also no poolrooms, newspaper advertisement of tips and no transmission of news for any book purposes by wire. Except for the arrangement concerning the length of meetings and presence of book makers the Miller bill will otherwise be unimpaired.
